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World Trade Organization (WTO)

WTO issues annual report

On 31 May 2017, the WTO [announced](#) that it has published its 2017 Annual Report covering the organization's activities in 2016 and early 2017. The Report opens with a message from Director-General Roberto Azevêdo, who looks back on a year marked by the entry into force of the Trade Facilitation Agreement and an important amendment to the WTO's intellectual property agreement as well as heightened engagement by a range of stakeholders in the activities of the WTO.

The first part of the Report provides a brief overview of the past year, focusing on the WTO's major areas of activity. The second part provides more in-depth accounts of the WTO's work, covering trade negotiations, implementation of WTO agreements, trade monitoring, dispute settlement, support for developing countries and outreach activity.

Trade Policy Review: Switzerland and Liechtenstein

Mexico authorized to retaliate against US in tuna dispute

The WTO [announced](#) that on 22 May the Dispute Settlement Body (DSB) granted authorization for Mexico to suspend the application of tariff concessions to the United States in "United States – Measures Concerning the Importation, Marketing and Sale of Tuna and Tuna Products" (DS381). The WTO summary stated:

Mexico said that in July 2012 the DSB had determined that US measures in DS381 were WTO-inconsistent. The United States modified these measures in 2013 but, once again, the DSB had found them to be WTO-inconsistent. In March 2016 Mexico submitted a request for authorization to suspend concessions. In response, the United States objected to the level of concessions proposed by Mexico. It also modified the measure for a third time.

On 25 April a WTO arbitrator found that the level of nullification and impairment should refer to the initial measure aimed at compliance (the 2013 measure) and decided to leave determination of compliance of the 2016 measure to the panel [established on 9 May 2016](#) at the request of the United States. The arbitrator also concluded that Mexico could request the DSB to authorize the suspension of concessions to a level which did not exceed US\$ 163.23 million annually. Mexico thus requested au-

thorization to suspend concessions to the United States up to the amount determined by the arbitrator.

The United States said it regretted Mexico's request for authorization to suspend concessions and that the 2016 measure brought it into compliance with its WTO obligations. The arbitrator had based its findings on a measure that no longer existed, which is inconsistent with the purpose and proper function of the WTO's Dispute Settlement Understanding (DSU), the US added.

Several WTO members commented on the arbitrator's findings and the arbitrator's decision to authorize the telecasting of certain statements of the arbitration hearing.

Pursuant to the request by Mexico under Article 22.7 of the DSU, the DSB agreed to grant authorization to suspend the application to the United States of tariff concessions or other obligations consistent with the arbitrator's decision.

World Customs Organization (WCO)

Antigua and Barbuda joins the WCO as the 182nd Member

On 10 April 2017, Antigua and Barbuda deposited with the Belgian Government its instrument of accession to the *Convention Establishing a Customs Co-operation Council* and became the 182nd Member of the Organization.

An English-speaking Island State in the Eastern Caribbean, Antigua and Barbuda will be part of the WCO's Americas/Caribbean region.

The Customs Co-operation Council is the official name of the World Customs Organization.

TCCV issues advisory opinion on royalties and licenses

On 31 May 2017, the WCO announced that a new Advisory Opinion on royalties and licence fees was finalized at the 44th Session of the Technical Committee on Customs Valuation (TCCV) which took place in Brussels from 8 to 12 May 2017.

The instrument, based on a case submitted by Mexico, provides an opinion on a scenario where royalties have been paid by a franchisee to a franchisor for the use of the brands and system connected to the operation of stores under a franchise agreement. The Advisory Opinion concludes that as the payment of royalties in this particular case is not related to the imported goods but to the use of the brands and system of the franchisor in the country of importation for the manufacture and sale of the products bearing the intellectual property of the franchisor, the royalties are not to be included in the Customs value of the imported goods.

Under the WTO Valuation Agreement, certain royalties and licence fees are to be included in the Customs value of imported goods. This is an important and complex aspect of Customs valuation and each case must be examined on its own merits to determine whether or not the royalties and licence fees should be included. The new instrument, available [here](#), will be published in the [WCO Valuation Compendium](#), following approval by the WCO Council in July 2017.

APEC Trade Ministers Statement after 23rd Meeting

In Hanoi, Vietnam, Trade Ministers of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Forum issued an [actions statement](#) reflecting the outcomes of their 23rd Meeting. Listed below are the subjects covered.

Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) Agreement Ministerial Statement

Ministers and Vice Ministers from the Trans-Pacific Partnership signatory countries [issued](#) the following Statement:

21 May 2017. Ha Noi, Viet Nam – Ministers and Vice Ministers from Australia, Brunei Darussalam, Canada, Chile, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Malaysia, Peru, Singapore and Viet Nam met today to discuss the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) in the margins of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Ministers Responsible for Trade.

The Ministers reaffirmed the balanced outcome and the strategic and economic significance of the TPP highlighting its principles and high standards as a way to promote regional economic integration, contribute positively to the economic growth prospects of its member countries, and create new opportunities for workers, families, farmers, businesses and consumers.

The Ministers agreed on the value of realising the TPP's benefits and to that end, they agreed to launch a process to assess options to bring the comprehensive, high quality Agreement into force expeditiously, including how to facilitate membership for the original signatories.

The Ministers tasked their senior trade officials to engage to take forward the preparation of this assessment. Ministers asked for this work to be completed before they meet in the margins of the APEC Economic Leaders Meeting on 10-11 November 2017 in Da Nang, Viet Nam.

The Ministers also underlined their vision for the TPP to expand to include other economies that can accept the high standards of the TPP.

These efforts would address our concern about protectionism, contribute to maintaining open markets, strengthening the rules-based international trading system, increasing world trade, and raising living standards.

ICC releases rules of origin recommendations for trade agreements

On 3 May 2017, the International Chamber of Commerce (ICC) [announced](#) that it has released recommendations on rules of origin in preferential trade agreements (PTAs), highlighting the challenges traders and suppliers face due to the lack of coherence among preferential rules of origin requirements across the globe. The announcement said, in pertinent part:

The new recommendations were issued this week as customs and business representatives from all over the world convened in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, to discuss the complexities behind rules of origin at the World Customs Organisation (WCO) Global Origin Conference. With limited progress being made in the Doha round of multilateral trade negotiations, countries are increasingly looking to bilateral and regional PTAs as an alternative. As a result, PTAs have multiplied, with over 400 such deals currently in existence, including “mega-regional” PTA negotiations such as the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) or the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP).

This proliferation of agreements has led to confusing and inconsistent market entry arrangements, which are particularly felt by small and medium enterprises (SMEs) that have fewer resources. As new PTAs increasingly overlap existing ones, diverging rules of origin regulations and procedures are becoming a trade barrier along the whole supply chain.

ICC sets forth eight recommendations calling for global horizontal cohesion through streamlining certification procedures:

1. Follow the WCO Revised Kyoto Convention

Governments party to PTA negotiations should streamline rules of origin and origin procedures by following the provisions of the WCO Revised Kyoto Convention, in line with the principles of the World Trade Organisation's (WTO) Trade Facilitation Agreement (TFA).

2. Enable 'extended cumulation' or 'cross cumulation' between common agreements

Countries should insert provisions into PTAs allowing common bilateral parties to differing regional agreements to share or cumulate origin across trading regions and agreements.

3. Develop common procedural standards for customs verification of origin documentation

The WCO, in close cooperation with the private sector, should develop common procedural principles under PTAs in the spirit of the provisions of the WTO TFA.

4. Insert provisions for the resolution of minor origin disputes in PTAs

Origin disputes under PTAs should not be decided unilaterally by the customs authority of a single trade agreement partner. Instead, PTAs should contain provisions for resolution of such disputes within commercially responsive timeframes.

5. Consider the customs capacity of trading partners

Governments preparing to enter a PTA should ensure there are capacity building programmes in place prior to entry into force of the Agreement, particularly when dealing with developing and emerging markets.

6. Aim for horizontal global cohesion of PTA rules of origin

Standardising procedural requirements across PTAs makes trade easier, increasing transparency and predictability. It also allows business processes along the whole supply chain to be replicated and automated, further reducing trading costs.

7. Align on the starting point for PTA negotiations

Governments should align on the starting point from which to commence negotiations on trade agreements. This would help streamline international trade and ultimately reduce costs for business and consumers.

8. Consider PTAs as steps towards a multilateral agreement

The streamlining of mega-regional PTA negotiations could create momentum towards broader trade liberalisation.

President extends national emergency with respect to the stabilization of Iraq

On May 18, 2017, the *Federal Register* published Presidential [Notice of May 16, 2017 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to the Stabilization of Iraq](#) which extends for an additional year the national emergency first declared on May 22, 2003, by Executive Order (EO) 13303, and modified in scope and relied upon for additional steps taken in EO 13315 of August 28, 2003, EO 13350 of July 29, 2004, EO 13364 of November 29, 2004, EO 13438 of July 17, 2007, and EO 13668 of May 27, 2014.

The national emergency is being extended because the obstacles to the orderly reconstruction of Iraq, the restoration and maintenance of peace and security in

the country, and the development of political, administrative, and economic institutions in Iraq continue to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States.

President extends national emergency with respect to Yemen

On May 10, 2017, the *Federal Register* published Presidential [Notice of May 8, 2017 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to Yemen](#), which extends the national emergency with respect to Yemen for an additional year. The national emergency was originally declared by EO 13611 (May 16, 2012) to deal with the unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States constituted by the actions and policies of certain members of the Government of Yemen and others. These actions and policies threatened Yemen's peace, security, and stability, including by obstructing the political process in Yemen and the implementation of the agreement of November 23, 2011, between the Government of Yemen and those in opposition to it, which provided for a peaceful transition of power that meets the legitimate demands and aspirations of the Yemeni people for change.

The national emergency is being extended because the actions and policies of certain members of the Government of Yemen and others in threatening Yemen's peace, security, and stability continue to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States.

President extends national emergency with respect to Syria

On May 10, 2017, the *Federal Register* published Presidential [Notice of May 9, 2017 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to the Actions of the Government of Syria](#), which extends the national emergency with respect to the actions of Syria for an additional year. The national emergency was originally declared by EO 13338 (May 11, 2004) which authorized the blocking of property of certain persons and prohibited the exportation or reexportation of certain goods to Syria. The national emergency was modified in scope and relied upon for additional steps taken in EO 13399 of April 25, 2006, EO 13460 of February 13, 2008, EO 13572 of April 29, 2011, EO 13573 of May 18, 2011, EO 13582 of August 17, 2011, EO 13606 of April 22, 2012, and EO 13608 of May 1, 2012.

The national emergency and its actions are being continued because the regime's brutality and repression of the Syrian people, who have been calling for freedom and a representative government, not only endangers the Syrian people themselves, but also generates instability throughout the region. The Syrian regime's actions and policies, including with respect to chemical and biological weapons, supporting terrorist organizations, and obstructing the Lebanese government's ability to function effectively, continue to foster the rise of extremism and sectarianism and pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States.

President extends national emergency with respect to the Central African Republic

On May 10, 2017, the *Federal Register* published Presidential [Notice of May 9, 2017 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to the Central African Republic](#), which extends for an additional year the national emergency first declared in EO 13667 (May 12, 2017) to deal with the unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States constituted by the situation in and in relation to the Central African Republic, which has been

marked by a breakdown of law and order, intersectorian tension, widespread violence and atrocities, and the pervasive, often forced recruitment and use of child soldiers, and which threatens the peace, security, or stability of the Central African Republic and neighboring states.

The national emergency is being extended because the situation in and in relation to the Central African Republic continues to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States

President signs Executive Order establishing Office of Trade and Manufacturing Policy

On April 29, 2017, President Trump signed [Executive Order 13797 of April 29, 2017 – Establishment of Office of Trade and Manufacturing Policy](#) [published in the *Federal Register* on May 4, 2017], which establishes an Office of Trade and Manufacturing Policy (OTMP) within the White House Office. The OTMP's mission is "to defend and serve American workers and domestic manufacturers while advising the President on policies to increase economic growth, decrease the trade deficit, and strengthen the United States manufacturing and defense industrial bases."

The OTMP's responsibilities will be to:

- advise the President on innovative strategies and promote trade policies consistent with the President's stated goals;
- serve as a liaison between the White House and the Department of Commerce and undertake trade-related special projects as requested by the President; and
- help improve the performance of the executive branch's domestic procurement and hiring policies, including through the implementation of the policies described in Executive Order 13788 of April 18, 2017 (Buy American and Hire American).

President signs EO addressing trade agreements 'violations and abuses'

On April 29, 2017, President Trump signed [Executive Order 13796 of April 29, 2017 – Addressing Trade Agreement Violations and Abuses](#) [published in the *Federal Register* on May 4, 2017]. The Executive Order (EO) states that

Every trade agreement and investment agreement entered into by the United States, and all trade relations and trade preference programs of the United States, should enhance our economic growth, contribute favorably to our balance of trade, and strengthen the American manufacturing base. Many United States free trade agreements, investment agreements, and trade relations have failed, in whole or in part, to meet these criteria. The result has been large and persistent trade deficits, a lack of reciprocal treatment of American goods and investment, the offshoring of factories and jobs, the loss of American intellectual property and reduced technological innovation, downward pressure on wage and income growth, and an impaired tax base. It is the policy of the United States to negotiate new trade agreements, investment agreements, and trade relations that benefit American workers and domestic manufacturers, farmers, and ranchers; protect our intellectual property; and encourage domestic research and development. It is also the policy of the United States to renegotiate or terminate any existing trade agreement, investment agreement, or trade relation that, on net, harms the United States economy, United States businesses, United States intellectual property rights and innovation rate, or the American people.

The EO requires the Secretary of Commerce and the United States Trade Representative (USTR), in consultation with the Secretaries of State and the Treasury, the Attorney General, and the Director of the Office of Trade and Manufacturing Policy, to conduct comprehensive performance reviews of:

- all bilateral, plurilateral, and multilateral trade agreements and investment agreements to which the United States is a party; and
- all trade relations with countries governed by the rules of the World Trade Organization (WTO) with which the United States does not have free trade agreements but with which the United States runs significant trade deficits in goods.

The performance reviews, which are to be submitted within 180 days from the date of the EO are to identify:

- those violations or abuses of any United States trade agreement, investment agreement, WTO rule governing any trade relation under the WTO, or trade preference program that are harming American workers or domestic manufacturers, farmers, or ranchers; harming our intellectual property rights; reducing our rate of innovation; or impairing domestic research and development;
- unfair treatment by trade and investment partners that is harming American workers or domestic manufacturers, farmers, or ranchers; harming our intellectual property rights; reducing our rate of innovation; or impairing domestic research and development;
- instances where a trade agreement, investment agreement, trade relation, or trade preference program has failed with regard to such factors as predicted new jobs created, favorable effects on the trade balance, expanded market access, lowered trade barriers, or increased United States exports; and
- lawful and appropriate actions to remedy or correct the deficiencies identified.

The findings will be used to help guide trade policy and trade negotiations. In addition, the EO directs the Secretary of Commerce, the USTR, and other heads of executive departments and agencies, as appropriate, to take every appropriate and lawful action to address violations of trade law, abuses of trade law, or instances of unfair treatment.

President signs Consolidated Appropriations Act

On May 4, 2017, the U.S. Senate (by a 79-18 vote) agreed to the House of Representatives [Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2017](#) and sent it to the President for signature. The President signed the Act on May 5, 2017 and it was assigned Public Law 115-31. A [signing statement](#) by the President accompanied the legislation which indicated that certain specific provisions may unconstitutionally restrict, impede or undermine his ability to act. The President said that his administration would treat or construe such provisions consistent with his constitutional responsibilities, authorities or Presidential prerogatives or, in some cases as merely advisory.

CBP and ICE appropriations

Under Title II of the Act, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) will receive \$10,900,636,000 (operations and support), including funds from the Harbor Maintenance Fee trust fund. \$681,441,500 is available until Sept. 30, 2018. In addition, \$273,617,000 is appropriated for CBP's procurement, constructions and improvements (including vessels, aircraft and unmanned aerial systems), of which \$252,842,000 remains available until Sept. 30, 2019 and \$20,775,000 remains available until Sept. 30, 2021.

Under Title VI additional appropriations of \$274,813,000 (operations and support) and \$497,400,000 (Procurement, construction and improvements) is appropriated, including money for existing border fencing and high technology border security.

Under Title II of the Act, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) will receive \$6,168,532,000; of which \$6,000,000 shall remain available until expended for efforts to enforce laws against forced child labor. Not less than \$15,000,000 shall be available for investigation of intellectual property rights (IPR) violations, including operation of the National IPR Coordination Center. \$18,700,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2018, for the Visa Security Program and investigations abroad. Not less than \$3,471,806,000 shall be for enforcement, detention, and removal operations, including transportation of unaccompanied minor aliens. Some money is withheld until a comprehensive plan for immigration data is submitted, and some enforcement funds are available until expended. An additional \$29,800,000 is available for procurement, construction, and improvements, until September 30, 2019. ICE also receives additional funding under Title VI.

Additional funding for CBP is also available from certain special accounts or collections. However certain amounts are subject to mandatory rescissions.

The Act extends certain user fees under Section 13031(j)(3)(A) of the *Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985* (19 U.S.C. 58c(j)(3)(A)) from September 30, 2025 to January 14, 2026, and extends the Merchandise Processing Fee at the rate set in Section 503 of the *United States–Korea Free Trade Agreement Implementation Act* (Public Law 112–41; 19 U.S.C. 3805 note) from September 30, 2025 until January 14, 2026.

Supreme Court holds domestic and foreign sales exhaust patents, allowing goods to be re-sold

On May 30, 2017, the U.S. Supreme Court decided [*Impression Products, Inc. v. Lexmark International, Inc.* \(Slip Op. 15-1189\)](#) which hold that when a patentee sells one of its products, however, the patentee can no longer control that item through the patent laws—its patent rights are said to “exhaust,” reversing a decision of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit (CAFC).

Summary:

The Respondent, Lexmark, owns a number of patents that cover components of toner cartridges and the manner in which they are used. When Lexmark sells toner cartridges, it gives consumers two options: One option is to buy a toner cartridge at full price, with no restrictions. The other option is to buy a cartridge at a discount through Lexmark’s “Return Program.” In exchange for the lower price, customers who buy through the Return Program must sign a contract agreeing to use the cartridge only once and to refrain from transferring the cartridge to anyone but Lexmark.

Remanufacturers acquire empty Lexmark toner cartridges—including Return Program cartridges—from purchasers in the United States, refill them with toner, and then resell them. They do the same with Lexmark cartridges that they acquire from purchasers overseas and import into the United States. Lexmark sued a number of these remanufacturers, including petitioner Impression Products, Inc., for patent infringement with respect to both groups of cartridges.

The Supreme Court held that Lexmark exhausted its patent rights in the Return Program cartridges that it sold in the United States. A patentee's decision to sell a product exhausts all of its patent rights in that item, regardless of any restrictions the patentee purports to impose. As a result, even if the restrictions in Lexmark's contracts with its customers were clear and enforceable under contract law, they do not entitle Lexmark to retain patent rights in an item that it has elected to sell.

It also held that Lexmark cannot sue Impression Products for infringement with respect to the cartridges sold abroad. An authorized sale outside the United States, just as one within the United States, exhausts all rights under the Patent Act, just as it does in copyright law.

Chief Justice Roberts delivered the opinion of the Court, in which Associate justices Kennedy, Thomas, Breyer, Alito, Sotomayor, and Kagan joined. Justice Ginsburg filed an opinion concurring in that part of the holding regarding domestic sales and dissenting in that part of the holding regarding foreign exhaustion.

Federal Circuit affirms CIT decision requiring parties, including sureties, to file protests against interest assessments on liquidated entries

On May 26, 2017, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit (CAFC) affirmed a judgment from the U.S. Court of International Trade (CIT) which held that the government was entitled to interest on unpaid duties under 19 U.S.C. § 580 (statutory 6% against sureties) from the date of CBP's first formal demand and §1505(d) (variable interest rate against importers and sureties) up to the amount of the bond. It also held that a surety company or importer wishing to challenge the interest must file a protest with U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), just as in any decision for a charge or exaction by CBP. Additionally the CAFC upheld the CIT's decision to not award equitable interest, as being at the court's discretion. [U.S. v. American Home Assurance Company](#) (Slip Op. 2016-1088, 2016-1090 May 26, 2017).

U.S. Senate confirms new USTR

On May 11, 2017, the U.S. Senate [confirmed](#) President Trump's nominee, Robert Lighthizer as the United States Trade Representative (USTR). Mr. Lighthizer required a waiver from a law which prohibited individuals from being the USTR if they had previously represented foreign governments in disputes against the United States. Mr. Lighthizer has served as a trade attorney in private practice for many years and represented two foreign governments many years ago. Before that, he was a deputy USTR prior to 1985. He had broad support from Republicans and most Democrats and was approved in an 82-14 vote. A few Republicans voted against his confirmation (and some expressed concern) over his position on NAFTA. Sens. McCain and Sasse said they were not convinced Mr. Lighthizer understands the "positive economic benefits" of NAFTA.

USTR seeks comments on NAFTA negotiating objectives

On May 23, 2017, the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR) published in the *Federal Register* a [request for comments and notice of public hearing](#) [Docket No. USTR-2017-0006] concerning the negotiating objectives regarding modernization of the *North American Free Trade Agreement* (NAFTA) with Canada and Mexico. The notice states:

The United States intends to commence negotiations with Canada and Mexico regarding modernization of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). The

NAFTA was negotiated more than 25 years ago, and, while our economy and U.S. businesses have changed considerably over that period, NAFTA has not. The United States seeks to support higher-paying jobs in the United States and to grow the U.S. economy by improving U.S. opportunities under NAFTA. Our specific objectives for this negotiation will comply with the specific objectives set forth by Congress in section 102 of the Bipartisan Congressional Trade Priorities and Accountability Act of 2015. The Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR) is seeking public comments on matters relevant to the modernization of NAFTA in order to inform development of U.S. negotiating positions.

To assist USTR as it develops its negotiating objectives and positions for the agreement, the Trade Policy Staff Committee (TPSC) invites interested persons to submit comments and/or oral testimony at a public hearing on matters relevant to the modernization of the NAFTA. In particular, the TPSC invites comments addressed to:

- (a) General and product-specific negotiating objectives for Canada and Mexico in the context of a NAFTA modernization.
- (b) Economic costs and benefits to U.S. producers and consumers of removal of any remaining tariffs and removal or reduction of non-tariff barriers on articles traded with Canada and Mexico.
- (c) Treatment of specific goods (described by HTSUS numbers), including comments on—
 - (1) Product-specific import or export interests or barriers,
 - (2) Experience with particular measures that should be addressed in negotiations, and
 - (3) Addressing any remaining tariffs on articles traded with Canada, including ways to address export priorities and import sensitivities related to Canada and Mexico in the context of the NAFTA.
- (d) Customs and trade facilitation issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (e) Appropriate modifications to rules of origin or origin procedures for NAFTA qualifying goods.
- (f) Any unwarranted sanitary and phytosanitary measures and technical barriers to trade imposed by Canada and Mexico that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (g) Relevant barriers to trade in services between the United States and Canada and Mexico that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (h) Relevant digital trade issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (i) Relevant trade-related intellectual property rights issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (j) Relevant investment issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (k) Relevant competition-related matters that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (l) Relevant government procurement issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (m) Relevant environmental issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (n) Relevant labor issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (o) Issues of particular relevance to small and medium-sized businesses that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (p) Relevant trade remedy issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.
- (q) Relevant state-owned enterprise issues that should be addressed in the negotiations.

Persons wishing to testify at the hearing must provide written notification and a summary of your testimony by Monday, June 12, 2017. Written comments also are due by Monday, June 12, 2017. A hearing will be held at 9 a.m. in the Main Hearing Room of the United States International Trade Commission, 500 E Street SW, Washington, D.C. 20436, on Tuesday, June 27, 2017. Details are in the *Federal Register* notice.

USTR notifies Congress of intent to renegotiate NAFTA

On May 18, 2017, the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR) [announced](#) that USTR Robert Lighthizer notified Congress that President Trump intends to renegotiate the *North American Free Trade Agreement* (NAFTA). Through these negotiations, the United States seeks to support higher-paying jobs in the United States and to grow the U.S. economy by improving U.S. opportunities to trade with Canada and Mexico. According to the announcement:

In the letter to Congress, Ambassador Lighthizer expresses the Trump Administration's commitment to concluding the negotiations with timely and substantive results for U.S. consumers, businesses, farmers, ranchers, and workers. These goals will be pursued consistent with U.S. priorities and the negotiating objectives established by Congress in the Bipartisan Congressional Trade Priorities and Accountability Act of 2015 (TPA). Negotiations will begin no earlier than August 16, 2017.

"Today, President Trump fulfilled one of his key promises to the American people. For years, politicians have called for the renegotiation of this agreement, but President Trump is the first to follow through with that promise," said Ambassador Lighthizer. "USTR will now continue consultations with Congress and American stakeholders to create an agreement that advances the interests of America's workers, farmers, ranchers, and businesses."

USTR will publish a notice in the *Federal Register* requesting public input on the direction, focus, and content of the North American Free Trade Agreement negotiations.

President Trump announced the United States' intention to engage in negotiations related to NAFTA on February 2, 2017. Since then, USTR has begun consultations with committees of jurisdiction in Congress and advisory committees, as outlined by TPA.

The notification begins the process. Negotiations will begin no earlier than 90 days later – about mid-August. The *Bipartisan Congressional Trade Priorities and Accountability Act of 2015* lays out the framework for consultations and requires the negotiating priorities to be made public 30 days before the talks start.

ITC launches safeguard investigation on crystalline silicon photovoltaic cells

ITC to accept additional comments on certain duty suspensions and reductions

On May 25, 2017, the U.S. International Trade Commission (ITC) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) that the ITC will provide a limited opportunity for additional comments from the public on certain petitions for duty suspensions and reductions included in its preliminary report to the House Committee on Ways and Means and the Senate Committee on Finance.

Under the *American Manufacturing Competitiveness Act of 2016* (the Act), the ITC will submit a preliminary report on the petitions for duty suspensions and reductions that have been filed with it to the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee on June 9, 2017.

In that report, the ITC will categorize petitions as (a) petitions that meet the requirements of the Act with or without modification (Category I, II, III, or IV petitions), (b) petitions that do not contain the information required by the Act or that were not filed by a likely beneficiary (Category V petitions), and (c) petitions that the ITC does not recommend for inclusion in a miscellaneous tariff bill (Category VI petitions). The ITC has decided that it will accept additional comments from the public on any petitions that are listed as Category VI petitions for a ten day period beginning on June 12, 2017, at 8:45 a.m. As provided in the *Federal Register* notice, all such comments must be submitted to the ITC electronically through the ITC Web site <https://www.usitc.gov/mtbtps>. The ITC will not accept comments filed in paper form or in any other form or format.

The opening date and time for submission of additional comments on Category VI petitions is June 12, 2017, 8:45 a.m. EST. The closing date and time is June 21, 2017.

ITC institutes two additional investigations on digital trade

On May 8, 2017, the ITC published in the *Federal Register* a [document](#) announcing that, in response to the request from the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) dated January 13, 2017 under section 332(g) of the *Tariff Act of 1930*, the ITC has instituted the second and third of three investigations on global digital trade: Investigation No. 332–562, *Global Digital Trade 2: The Business-to-Business Market, Key Foreign Trade Restrictions, and U.S. Competitiveness*; and Investigation No. 332–563, *Global Digital Trade 3: The Business-to-Consumer Market, Key Foreign Trade Restrictions, and U.S. Competitiveness*. The ITC will schedule a public hearing and provide opportunity for the public to file written submissions in connection with both investigations, with dates and procedures relating to both announced in a later notice.

As requested by the USTR, the ITC's report on the second investigation, titled *Global Digital Trade 2: The Business-to-Business Market, Key Foreign Trade Restrictions, and U.S. Competitiveness*, will build on the first report to:

- Provide qualitative, and to the extent possible, quantitative analysis of measures in key foreign markets (identified in the first report) that affect the ability of U.S. firms to develop and/ or supply business-to-business digital products and services abroad; and
- Assess, using case studies or other qualitative and quantitative methods, the impact of these measures on the competitiveness of U.S. firms engaged in the sale of digital products and services, as well as on international trade and investment flows associated with digital products and services related to significant business-to-business technologies.

The ITC expects to deliver this second report to the USTR by October 29, 2018.

As requested by the USTR, the ITC's report on the third investigation, titled *Global Digital Trade 3: The Business-to-Consumer Market, Key Foreign Trade Restrictions, and U.S. Competitiveness*, will build on the first and second reports to:

- Provide qualitative, and to the extent possible, quantitative analysis of measures in key foreign markets (identified in the first report) that affect the ability of U.S. firms to develop and/ or supply business-to-consumer digital products and services abroad; and
- Assess, using case studies or other qualitative and quantitative methods, the impact of these measures on the competitiveness of U.S. firms engaged in the sale of digital products and services, as well as on international trade and investment flows associated with digital products and services related to significant business-to-consumer technologies.

The ITC expects to deliver this third report to the USTR by March 29, 2019.

Joint US-China Economic Cooperation 100-Day Plan released

On May 11, 2017, the Treasury Department released a "[Joint Press Release: Initial Results of the 100-Day Action Plan of the U.S. - China Comprehensive Economic Dialogue](#)." After Presidents Trump and Xi agreed at their Mar-a-Lago meeting to advance U.S. - China economic cooperation with a 100-day action

plan under the framework of the U.S. - China Comprehensive Economic Dialogue, The U.S. Secretary of the Treasury, Steven Mnuchin and Commerce Wilbur Ross and Chinese Vice Premier Wang Yang negotiated intensively to make progress on key issues. The three co-chairs reached consensus on initial commitments under the 100-day plan and objectives for next steps. The two sides have reached consensus on addressing issues in areas including agricultural trade, financial services, investment, and energy. According to a [U.S.-China joint fact sheet](#) also released:

Initial Actions of the U.S.-China Economic Cooperation 100-Day Plan

1. Following one more round of technical consultations between the United States and China, China is to allow imports of U.S. beef on conditions consistent with international food safety and animal health standards and consistent with the 1999 Agricultural Cooperation Agreement, beginning as soon as possible but no later than July 16, 2017.
2. The United States and China are to resolve outstanding issues for the import of China origin cooked poultry to the United States as soon as possible, and after reaching consensus, the United States is to publish a proposed rule by July 16, 2017, at the latest, with the United States realizing China poultry exports as soon as possible.
3. China's National Biosafety Committee (NBC) is to hold a meeting by the end of May 2017, to conduct science-based evaluations of all eight pending U.S. biotechnology product applications to assess the safety of the products for their intended use. No additional information unrelated to safety assessment for intended use is to be requested of the applicants. For any product that does not pass the safety evaluation at the NBC meeting held in May 2017, the NBC is to operate with transparency by providing in writing to the applicants a complete list of requested information necessary to finalize the safety assessment for the products' intended use, along with an explanation of how the requested information would be relevant to the safety of the products' intended use. The NBC is to hold meetings as frequently and as soon as possible after an application is resubmitted in order to finalize reviews of remaining applications without undue delay. For the products that pass the safety evaluations of the NBC, China is to grant certificates within 20 working days in accordance with Administrative License Law of the People's Republic of China.
4. The United States welcomes China, as well as any of our trading partners, to receive imports of LNG from the United States. The United States treats China no less favorably than other non-FTA trade partners with regard to LNG export authorizations. Companies from China may proceed at any time to negotiate all types of contractual arrangement with U.S. LNG exporters, including long-term contracts, subject to the commercial considerations of the parties. As of April 25, 2017, the U.S. Department of Energy had authorized 19.2 billion cubic feet per day of natural gas exports to non-FTA countries.
5. By July 16, 2017, China is to allow wholly foreign-owned financial services firms in China to provide credit rating services, and to begin the licensing process for credit investigation.
6. The U.S. Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC) intends to extend by July 16, 2017 the current no-action relief to Shanghai Clearing House for six months, with further extensions amounting to up to three years, if appropriate and consistent with the conditions set forth in the no-action relief. The People's Bank of China and the CFTC are to work towards a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) concerning the cooperation and the exchange of information related to the oversight of cross-border clearing organizations.
7. By July 16, 2017, China is to issue any further necessary guidelines and allow wholly U.S.-owned suppliers of electronic payment services (EPS) to begin the licensing process. This should lead to full and prompt market access. China is to continue to allow Chinese banks to issue dual brand-dual currency bankcards that allow U.S. EPS suppliers to process foreign currency payment card transactions.
8. The applicable U.S. federal regulatory authorities remain committed to apply in the United States the same bank prudential supervisory and regulatory standards to Chi-

nese banking institutions as to other foreign banking institutions, in like circumstances and in accordance with U.S. law.

9. China is to issue both bond underwriting and settlement licenses to two qualified U.S. financial institutions by July 16, 2017.

10. The United States recognizes the importance of China's One Belt and One Road initiative and is to send delegates to attend the Belt and Road Forum May 14-15 in Beijing.

The United States welcomes direct investment by Chinese entrepreneurs as it does by entrepreneurs from other countries. The United States welcomes Chinese participation in the SelectUSA Investment Summit that will be held June 18-20 in Washington D.C.

The Joint Statement concluded:

Both sides also identified other issues that will require significant effort to resolve and achieve progress on within the 100-day period. Both sides further committed to strengthen communication and coordination to jointly advance those issues and achieve resolution as soon as possible. Further, as concrete progress is made in implementing the actions under the 100-day plan, the two sides will begin discussing a one-year plan to further solidify actions in promoting U.S. - China economic engagement and cooperation. Following implementation of the 100-day plan, the United States and China look forward to deepening engagement on these and other issues at the first meeting of the Comprehensive Economic Dialogue, to be held in the United States in the summer of 2017.

Commerce requests comments, announces hearing on section 232 national security investigation of imports of aluminum

On May 9, 2017, the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS), Office of Technology Evaluation, U.S. Department of Commerce published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) that on April 26, the Secretary of Commerce initiated an investigation to determine the effects on the national security of imports of aluminum. On April 27 President Trump issued a [memorandum](#) directing the Secretary to proceed expeditiously in conducting his investigation and submit a report on his findings to the President.

This investigation has been initiated under section 232 of the *Trade Expansion Act of 1962*, as amended. It is being undertaken in accordance with part 705 of the *National Security Industrial Base Regulations* (15 C.F.R. parts 700 to 709) (NSIBR). Interested parties are invited to submit written comments, data, analyses, or other information pertinent to the investigation to BIS. Commerce will also hold a public hearing on the investigation on June 22, 2017 in Washington, D.C. The *Federal Register* notice identifies the issues listed below on which Commerce is interested in obtaining the public's views. It also sets forth the procedures for public participation in the hearing and submission of written responses.

Commerce is particularly interested in comments and information directed to the criteria listed in § 705.4 of the NSIBR as they affect national security, including the following:

- Quantity of aluminum or other circumstances related to the importation of steel;
- Domestic production and productive capacity needed for aluminum to meet projected national defense requirements;
- Existing and anticipated availability of human resources, products, raw materials, production equipment, and facilities to produce aluminum;

- Growth requirements of the aluminum industry to meet national defense requirements and/or requirements to assure such growth;
- The impact of foreign competition on the economic welfare of the aluminum industry;
- The displacement of any domestic aluminum causing substantial unemployment, decrease in the revenues of government, loss of investment or specialized skills and productive capacity, or other serious effects;
- The displacement of any domestic steel causing substantial unemployment, decrease in the revenues of government, loss of investment or specialized skills and productive capacity, or other serious effects;
- Relevant factors that are causing or will cause a weakening of our national economy; and
- Any other relevant factors.

Interested parties are invited to submit written comments, data, analyses, or other information pertinent to the investigation to BIS. Commerce will also hold a public hearing on the investigation on June 22, 2017, in Washington, D.C. Comments may be submitted at any time but must be received by June 29, 2017.

National security investigations could sharply limit steel and aluminum imports

On April 20, 2017, President Trump issued a [memorandum](#) announcing that Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross had initiated an investigation of national security effects of steel imports and on April 27 President Trump issued a [memorandum](#) announcing a similar investigation of aluminum imports. Secretary Ross initiated the investigations pursuant to Section 232 of the *Trade Expansion Act of 1962*, a little-used provision that provides broad authority to impose import restrictions after an investigation lasting up to 270 days.

These steel and aluminum investigations are consistent with the President's prior statements on trade, such as when, as a candidate, he complained that "[f]oreign nations are dumping vast amounts of steel all over the United States." Secretary Ross has also indicated that he is considering additional Section 232 investigations (e.g., shipbuilding and semiconductors).

Investigations and Orders

Under Section 232, Secretary Ross will conduct studies into whether steel and aluminum are being "imported into the United States in such quantities or under such circumstances as to threaten to impair the national security." The Commerce Secretary is to consider a broad range of factors related to national security and "national economic welfare." Specifically, the studies are to examine, inter alia, (1) U.S. national defense requirements; (2) capacity of domestic industries to meet those requirements; (3) availability of human resources, products, raw materials and other supplies; (4) the requirements for growth of those industries; and (5) the importation of goods and their use to meet national security requirements. Under Section 232, the Secretary is also to consider "the relation of the economic welfare of the Nation to our national security," the effect of foreign competition on the economic welfare of domestic industries, impacts on employment, and effects on government revenues.

At the end of the steel and aluminum investigations, the Commerce Secretary is to submit reports to the President containing determinations on whether the imports "threaten to impair the national security." If the President agrees, the Presi-

dent may implement measures necessary “to adjust the imports” and “derivatives” to remove national security threats. Such action could include an agreement with exporting countries to limit exports or other trade restrictive measures such as tariffs and/or quotas.

Actions to Consider

Secretary Ross has indicated, consistent with Commerce Department regulations, that the Department will hold “at least one and perhaps more public hearings” and will accept written submissions for the Section 232 investigations. In addition, the investigations will, by statute, include input from the Defense Department on national defense requirements for steel and aluminum. Moreover, there will be opportunities for diplomatic and political input into the Section 232 processes.

Given the broad nature of the investigations (e.g., investigations covering “aluminum imports” which presumably includes raw materials, semi-fabricated articles and finished goods), the broad nature of the potential remedies (e.g., additional duties, etc.), it will be important for companies that rely on aluminum or steel articles to engage on this issue to ensure their interests are protected. Specifically, affected companies should identify relevant articles/products and analyze the national security implications of the same. Companies should also be prepared to participate in the investigation and pursue exemptions, where applicable.

ITA seeks comments on softwood lumber subsidies

On May 4, 2017, Enforcement and Compliance, International Trade Administration, Department of Commerce published in the *Federal Register* a [notice requesting public comments](#) on any subsidies, including stumpage subsidies, provided by certain countries exporting softwood lumber or softwood lumber products to the United States during the period July 1, 2016, through December 31, 2016.

On June 18, 2008, section 805 of Title VIII of the *Tariff Act of 1930* (the *Softwood Lumber Act of 2008*) was enacted into law. Under this provision, Commerce is mandated to submit to the appropriate Congressional committees a report every 180 days on any subsidy provided by countries exporting softwood lumber or softwood lumber products to the United States, including stumpage subsidies. Commerce submitted its last subsidy report on December 16, 2016. As part of its newest report, Commerce intends to include a list of subsidy programs identified with sufficient clarity by the public in response to this notice.

Given the large number of countries that export softwood lumber and softwood lumber products to the United States, Commerce is soliciting public comment only on subsidies provided by countries the exports of which accounted for at least one percent of total U.S. imports of softwood lumber by quantity, as classified under Harmonized Tariff Schedule subheading 4407.1001 (which accounts for the vast majority of imports), during the period July 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016. Comments are due within 30 days of publication.

State publishes annual certification of shrimp harvesting nations

On May 5, 2017, the State Department published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) [Public Notice: 9986] stating that on May 1, 2017, the Department certified that 13 shrimp-harvesting nations (Colombia, Costa Rica, Ecuador, El Salvador, Gabon, Guatemala, Guyana, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Nigeria, Panama, and Suriname) and four fisheries have a regulatory program comparable to that of the United States governing the incidental taking of the relevant species of sea turtles in the course of commercial shrimp harvesting and that the particular fishing environments of 26 shrimp-harvesting nations, one economy, and three fisheries do not pose a threat of the incidental taking of covered sea turtles in the course of such harvesting.

The Department also certified 26 shrimp-harvesting nations and one economy as having fishing environments that do not pose a danger to sea turtles. Sixteen nations have shrimping grounds only in cold waters where the risk of taking sea turtles is negligible: Argentina, Belgium, Canada, Chile, Denmark, Finland, Germany, Iceland, Ireland, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Russia, Sweden, the United Kingdom, and Uruguay. Ten nations and one economy (The Bahamas, Belize, China, the Dominican Republic, Fiji, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Oman, Peru, Sri Lanka, and Venezuela) only harvest shrimp using small boats with crews of less than five that use manual rather than mechanical means to retrieve nets or catch shrimp using other methods that do not threaten sea turtles. Use of such small-scale technology does not adversely affect sea turtles.

Section 609 of Public Law 101–162 prohibits imports into the United States of certain categories of shrimp unless the President (delegated to State) annually certifies either: (1) The harvesting nation has adopted a program governing the incidental taking of sea turtles in its commercial shrimp fishery comparable to the program in effect in the United States and has an incidental take rate comparable to that of the United States; or (2) the particular fishing environment of the harvesting nation does not pose a threat of the incidental taking of sea turtles.

This year State was unable to certify Pakistan because it did not demonstrate that the sea turtle protection program is comparable in effectiveness to that of the United States. Therefore, no wild caught shrimp or product of that shrimp harvested in Pakistan and exported after April 30, 2017, will be permitted entry into the United States.

A completed DS–2031 Shrimp Exporter's/Importer's Declaration must accompany all shipments of shrimp or products from shrimp into the United States.

NIST issues guide to electric/electronic compliance requirements

The National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) in the Department of Commerce has issued a revised edition of [A Guide to United States Electrical and Electronic Equipment Compliance Requirements](#). The Guide addresses electrical and electronic consumer products including those that will come into contact with food. In addition, it includes electrical and electronic products used in the workplace as well as electrical and electronic medical devices. The scope does not include vehicles or components of vehicles, electric or electronic toys, or recycling requirements. It includes mandatory regulations from the federal agencies shown below as well as standards and guidelines, with hypertext links to the source and to helpful publications prepared by the agencies. It also includes references to proposed federal regulations that were published in the *Federal Register* and are pending. With respect to state regulations, it includes a

reference table of mandatory state requirements and information on state requirements for appliance energy efficiency, button cell batteries, Bisphenol A in food contact products, chemicals of concern, restriction of hazardous substances (ROHS), electronic waste, flame retardants, mercury in electronic products, electrical code, packaging and labeling, and similar requirements. Additional information is provided for California, Illinois, Minnesota, Vermont and Washington.

NIST issues guide on cosmetic products compliance requirements

In May 2017, the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) in the Department of Commerce issued [A Guide to United States Cosmetic Products Compliance Requirements](#). The guide addresses the compliance requirements for basic cosmetics and soap. The [Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act](#) (FD&C Act) defines cosmetics as “articles intended to be rubbed, poured, sprinkled, or sprayed on, introduced into, or otherwise applied to the human body ... for cleansing, beautifying, promoting attractiveness, or altering the appearance” (FD&C Act, sec. 201(i)). Cosmetic products may include skin moisturizers, perfumes, lipsticks, fingernail polishes, eye and facial make-up preparations, cleansing shampoos, permanent waves, hair colors, and deodorants, as well as any substance that is intended for use as a component of a cosmetic product.

The guidance document does not cover drugs or over-the-counter (OTC) drug products (like anti-dandruff shampoos) or products that have both cosmetic and drug properties, *excluding sunscreens*, which are covered. The FDA defines a drug as any substance intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease, or that affects the structure or function of the body.

This guide also does not cover compliance requirements for toys that may be included with children's cosmetics.

CBP publishes notice of intent to distribute CDSOA offset for FY 2017

On May 31, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice of intent to distribute offset for Fiscal Year \(FY\) 2017](#), pursuant to the *Continued Dumping and Subsidy Offset Act of 2000* (better known as the “Byrd Amendment”). CBP is required to distribute assessed anti-dumping duties [ADD] or countervailing duties [CVD] (known as the continued

dumping and subsidy offset) for FY 2017 in connection with CVD orders, ADD orders, or findings under the *Antidumping Act of 1921* to affected domestic producers who file a timely certification to claim a portion of the offset for the listed orders or findings.

The document provides the instructions for affected domestic producers, or anyone alleging eligibility to receive a distribution, to file certifications to claim a distribution in relation to the listed orders or findings. Certifications to obtain a continued dumping and subsidy offset under a particular order or finding must be received by July 31, 2017. Any certification received after July 31, 2017 will be summarily denied, making claimants ineligible for the distribution.

Although the CDSOA was repealed in 2005, because of the statutory constraints in the assessments of ADD and CVD, as well as the additional time involved when the Government must initiate litigation to collect delinquent ADD and CVD, the CDSOA distribution process will be continued for an undetermined period. Consequently, the full impact of the CDSOA repeal on amounts available for distribution may be delayed for several years. It should also be noted that amounts distributed may be subject to recovery as a result of reliquidations, court actions, administrative errors, and other reasons.

Historically, the ADD and CVD assessed and received by CBP on CDSOA-subject entries, along with the interest assessed and received on those duties pursuant to 19 U.S.C. 1677g, were transferred to the CDSOA Special Account for distribution. Other types of interest, including delinquency interest that accrued pursuant to 19 U.S.C. 1505(d), equitable interest under common law, and interest under 19 U.S.C. 580, were not subject to distribution.

Section 605 of the *Trade Facilitation and Trade Enforcement Act of 2015* (TFTEA) (Pub. L. 114–125, February 24, 2016; codified as 19 U.S.C. 4401), provided new authority for CBP to deposit into the CDSOA Special Account for distribution delinquency interest that accrued pursuant to 19 U.S.C. 1505(d), equitable interest under common law, and interest under 19 U.S.C. 580 for payments received on or after October 1, 2014, on CDSOA subject entries if the payment was made by a surety in connection with a customs bond pursuant to a court order or judgment, or a litigation settlement with the surety, including any payments made during the litigation by the surety with respect to the bond.

On February 9, 2016, President Obama ordered the sequester of nonexempt budgetary resources for Fiscal Year 2017 pursuant to section 251A of the *Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985*, as amended. To implement this sequester during FY 2017, the calculation of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) requires a reduction of 6.9 percent of the assessed duties and interest received in the CDSOA Special Account (account number 015–12–5688). OMB has concluded that any amounts sequestered in the CDSOA Special Account during FY 2017 will become available in the subsequent fiscal year. See 2 U.S.C. 906(k)(6). As a result, CBP intends to include the funds that are temporarily reduced via sequester during FY 2017 in the continued dumping and subsidy offset for FY 2017, which will be distributed not later than 60 days after the first day of FY 2018 in accordance with 19 U.S.C. 1675c(c). In other words, the continued dumping and subsidy offset that affected domestic producers receive for FY 2017 will include the funds that were temporarily sequestered during FY 2017.

CBP requests applicants for User Fee Advisory Committee

On May 30, 2017, CBP published in the *Federal Register* a [document](#) [Docket No. USCBP–2017–0005] requesting individuals who are interested in serving on the CBP User Fee Advisory Committee to apply for appointment. The CBP User Fee Advisory Committee is tasked with providing advice to the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security through the Commissioner of CBP on matters related to the performance of inspections coinciding with the assessment of an agriculture, customs, or immigration user fee.

Applications for membership should be submitted to U.S. Customs and Border Protection at the address given in the *Federal Register* on or before July 14, 2017.

CBP publishes quarterly interest rates

On May 26, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a [general notice](#) that advises the public that the quarterly Internal Revenue Service interest rates used to calculate interest on overdue accounts (underpayments) and refunds (overpayments) of customs duties will remain the same from the previous quarter. For the calendar quarter beginning April 1, 2017, the interest rates for overpayments will be 3 percent for corporations and 4 percent for non-corporations, and the interest rate for underpayments will be 4 percent for both corporations and non-corporations.

CBP issues 2017 TRQ for tuna in airtight containers

On May 18, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a [document](#) [CBP Dec. 17–02] announcing the Tariff Rate Quota (TRQ) for Calendar Year 2017 for tuna classifiable under subheading 1604.14.22, *Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States* (HTSUS). Each year, the TRQ for tuna described in subheading 1604.14.22, HTSUS, is calculated as a percentage of the tuna in airtight containers entered, or withdrawn from warehouse, for consumption during the preceding Calendar Year. It has been determined that 14,609,465 kilograms of tuna in airtight containers may be entered, or withdrawn from warehouse, for consumption at the rate of 6.0 percent *ad valorem* under subheading 1604.14.22, HTSUS during the Calendar Year 2017. Any such tuna which is entered, or withdrawn from warehouse, for consumption during the current calendar year in excess of this quota will be dutiable at the rate of 12.5 percent *ad valorem* under subheading 1604.14.30 HTSUS.

CBP processing of DTCC licenses for carnet importations

On May 12, 2017, CBP issued [CSMS #17-000274 CBP Processing of DTCC Licenses for Carnet Importations](#). The CSMS explains how paper carnets will work in connection with AES:

Carnets are processed using the paper carnet and are not yet automated. As a result, the ability to collect information for Partner Government Agencies, including licenses, is limited to paper as well. When processing carnets, CBP will allow the use of paper copies of the export licensing documents in lieu of electronic information. As a matter of policy, CBP will not reject carnets for the purpose of collecting license information electronically. Export procedures will still require AES filing with appropriate license documentation.

- At the time of arrival in the U.S. the paper carnets will be presented to CBP for review and notation as appropriate.
- If the merchandise being temporarily imported requires a DSP-61, Temporary Import License, and/or DSP-73 License for Temporary Export, the license holder is to present a copy of the license along with the carnet.
- CBP personnel will review the carnet and license to determine correctness and perform any necessary examinations or reviews as per current policy.
- CBP personnel will appropriately annotate the correct importation counterfoil of the carnet and follow all current processing instructions for carnets.
- CBP personnel will annotate the license in the Automated Export System (AES) in the comments section. The comments should include the date, the processing port, carnet identifying number, and the licensed quantity, description and value being imported.
- Exporters will have to file the Electronic Export Information in AES against the appropriate license and present the carnet for outbound processing.

CBP issues CSMS on analyzing preference origin and completing certification when there is no tariff change rule (TCR)

On May 10, 2017, CBP issued [CSMS #17-000270 FTA Origination Analysis and Certification when no Tariff Change Rule \(TCR\)](#). We quote the CSMS below:

Manufacturers, exporters and importers are advised that a very limited number of tariff items in the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTSUS) do not have corresponding free trade agreement (FTA) tariff change rules (TCRs) (also known as “product specific rules of origin” or by the acronym “PSRs”) because they were negotiated using a Harmonized Tariff Schedule (HTS) that was subsequently modified in 2007, 2012, or 2017, and the corresponding TCRs have not been implemented.

The following table shows the up-to-date/out-of-date status of the TCRs for each FTA:

Until revised TCRs are implemented, manufacturers/exporters/importers of affected goods seeking to perform a tariff-shift origination analysis should classify the good and its materials using the most recent HTSUS in which the tariff item has a corresponding TCR and perform the origination analysis using that year's HTSUS.

Until revised TCRs are implemented, the certificate of origin, ideally, should indicate both the current HTSUS number and the previously corresponding HTSUS number used to perform the origination analysis in parenthesis and with wording to that effect.

For example, beneath the description of the good in block 5 of the CO, the statement "(Origination analysis performed using HTSUS xxxx.xx.xxxx (20XX) since no TCR for item number yyyy.yy.yyyy in 2017 HTSUS.)" [Replace placeholders with the appropriate numbers/dates]. The CO could look something like this:

State determines certain countries do not cooperate with US anti-terrorism efforts

On May 26, 2017, the Department of State published in the *Federal Register* a [determination and certification](#) [Public Notice: 10006] to Congress that the following countries are not cooperating fully with United States antiterrorism efforts: Eritrea, Iran, Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK, or North Korea), Syria and Venezuela

The determination and certification were made under section 40A of the *Arms Export Control Act*.

BIS revises Entity List

On May 26, 2017, the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) published in the *Federal Register* a [final rule](#) [Docket No. 170303229-7229-01] that amends the *Export Administration Regulations* (EAR) by adding sixteen persons to the Entity List. The sixteen persons who are added to the Entity List have been determined by the U.S. Government to be acting contrary to the national security or foreign policy interests of the United States. These sixteen persons will be listed on the Entity List under the destinations of Pakistan, Turkey and the United Arab Emirates. This final rule is also modifying two existing entries in the Entity List under the destinations of China and Hong Kong.

US Government announces continuation of JCPOA waivers for US sanctions targeting Iran while imposing new sanctions related to Iran's ballistic missile program

On 17 May 2017, the US Department of State [announced](#) that the US Government would renew waivers of certain sanctions necessary to continue to implement US commitments under the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action ("JCPOA"). On the same day, the US Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control ("OFAC") designated additional parties for their involvement in Iran's military and ballistic missile program.

If the Trump Administration had not renewed these Presidential waivers, the US Iran sanctions suspended under the JCPOA would have snapped back into force. While allowing the Presidential waivers to lapse may not in itself constitute a breach of the JCPOA, the US Government resuming the application of the US sanctions would likely be viewed by the Iranians as a breach. With this announcement, the State Department insisted that issuing the waivers "does not diminish the United States' resolve to continue countering Iran's destabilizing activity in the region, whether it be supporting the Assad regime, backing terrorist organizations like Hezbollah, or supporting violent militias that undermine governments in Iraq and Yemen. And above all, the United States will never allow the regime in Iran to acquire a nuclear weapon." The State Department also expressed its concerns about Iran's continuing violation of human rights by simultaneously issuing a [semi-annual report](#) mandated by the US Congress regarding sanctions imposed on parties involved in human rights abuses in Iran.

The State Department's actions coincided with an announcement from OFAC that it was designating as Specially Designated Nationals ("SDNs") seven (7) individuals and entities in connection with Iran's ballistic missile program, including two (2) senior Iranian defense officials and a China-based network alleged to be supplying Iran's military and ballistic missile program. Additional information on these designations is available in OFAC's [Press Release](#). "US Persons" (i.e., (i) US citizens and permanent resident aliens / Green Card holders, wherever located or employed; (ii) entities organized under US laws and their non-US branches; and (iii) any parties physically located in the United States, even temporarily) are prohibited from directly or indirectly dealing with these SDNs as well as any entities 50% or more owned by one or more SDNs. Any property of such SDNs must be blocked (i.e., "frozen") if it comes within the possession or control of a US Person or within the United States.

OFAC updates list of medical supplies for Ukraine-related sanctions

On May 23, 2017, the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) publishing the updated list of items defined as medical supplies and generally licensed for exportation or reexportation to the Crimea region of Ukraine pursuant to General License 4 under Executive Order 13685 of December 19, 2014, which is part of OFAC's Ukraine-related sanctions program. OFAC is publishing the List of Medical Supplies both as originally posted on December 19, 2014 and as updated on August 12, 2016 to include additional items.

TTB cancels declaration requirement for Pinot Noir from the Languedoc-Roussillon Region of France

The Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau (TTB) recently published [TTB Industry Circular 2017-3](#), which serves as notice that, effective immediately, TTB is no longer requiring importers of certain bottled or bulk wine from the Languedoc-Roussillon region of France to obtain a declaration from the Government of France.

TTB previously obtained information from French authorities about investigations of wine producers and merchants in the Languedoc-Roussillon region of France who were suspected of selling wine labeled as pinot noir when the wine was not produced from pinot noir grapes. These investigations resulted in criminal charges of fraud and subsequent convictions for certain producers and merchants associated with the fraud. As a result, to help ensure the integrity of imported wines in the U.S. marketplace, TTB temporarily required U.S. importers of bottled or bulk wine from the Languedoc-Roussillon region of France covered by a certificate of label approval (COLA) naming pinot noir as the single grape varietal and an appellation of origin in the Languedoc-Roussillon region of France, to obtain a declaration from the Government of France.

TTB has remained in contact with France's General Directorate for Competition Policy, Consumer Affairs, and Fraud Control (DGCCRF) as the appeals process in those cases has proceeded. The DGCCRF informed TTB that the process was concluded and that new regulatory measures have been put into place to address the occurrence of such violations going forward.

USDA seeks comments on reorganization

CITA requests comments on Bahrain FTA commercial availability request

On May 22, 2017, the Committee for the Implementation of Textile Agreements (CITA) published in the *Federal Register* a [request for public comments](#) concerning a request for modification of the U.S.-Bahrain Free Trade Agreement (USBFTA) rules of origin for certain knit and woven apparel made from certain knit and woven fabrics.

The Government of the United States received a request from the Government of Bahrain, submitted on March 23, 2017, to initiate consultations under Article 3.2.3 of the USBFTA. Bahrain is requesting that the United States and Bahrain (“the Parties”) consider revising the rules of origin for certain knit and woven apparel to address availability of supply of certain knit and woven fabrics in the territories of the Parties. The President of the United States may proclaim a modification to the USBFTA rules of origin for textile and apparel products after the United States reaches an agreement with the Government of Bahrain on a modification under Article 3.2.5 of the USBFTA to address issues of availability of supply of fibers, yarns, or fabrics in the territories of the Parties. CITA is soliciting public comments on this request, in particular with regard to whether certain knit and woven fabrics can be supplied by the U.S. domestic industry in commercial quantities in a timely manner.

Commerce extends comment period for China NME investigation

On May 3, 2017, the Enforcement and Compliance, International Trade Administration, Department of Commerce published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) [Docket No.: 170328324–7425–02; A–570–053] extending the closing deadline for submitting comments to a request for public comment and information entitled *Certain Aluminum Foil From the People’s Republic of China: Notice of Initiation of Inquiry Into the Status of the People’s Republic of China as a Nonmarket Economy Country Under the Antidumping and Countervailing Duty Laws*, 82 Fed. Reg. 16162 (April 3, 2017). In the request for public comment and information, and as part of the less-than-fair-value investigation of certain aluminum foil from the PRC, Commerce is seeking broad input from the public regarding whether the PRC should continue to be treated as a nonmarket economy (NME) country under the antidumping and countervailing duty laws. Prohibition on the importation of certain used goods reinstated

On 15 May 2017, the *Boletín Oficial* published [Decree 333/2017](#) (5 May 2017), which reinstates a prohibition (for a period of five years) on the importation for consumption of certain used textile products covered by MERCOSUR Common Nomenclature (NCM) subheadings 6309.00.10 and 6309.00.90, which are presented in bulk or similar packaging. The reason given is that such goods pose a risk to health and public safety and the environment in general, which makes it impossible to carry out effective control over the import and marketing of such used products. Donations of used clothing to certain entities are exempt, but registration will be required.

Australia

Australia - Hong Kong FTA negotiations launched

The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) [announced](#) that Australia and Hong Kong launched negotiations for a free trade agreement (FTA) on 16 May 2017. Hong Kong is a Special Administrative Region of the People's Republic of China, and is able to enter into its own trade agreements. An Australia-Hong Kong FTA (A-HKFTA) would complement Australia's FTA with China and further integrate the Australian economy with Asia.

Australia is seeking a comprehensive FTA that meets the needs of Australian goods and services exporters, and investors.

For goods exporters, Australia could seek a commitment that Hong Kong would continue its zero tariffs levels on Australian goods exports. By addressing non-tariff barriers and customs procedures, we could aim to ensure that goods trade with Hong Kong operates as smoothly and simply as possible.

For services suppliers, Australia could seek to secure non-discriminatory access to the Hong Kong market, create greater regulatory certainty and automatically capture future unilateral liberalisation.

Australia could also seek to address a range of issues impacting on trade, including:

- digital trade (e.g. e-commerce);
- protection of intellectual property;
- temporary entry of business people;
- government procurement; and
- competition policy.

For investors, Australia could seek outcomes which protect investments, while at the same time, incorporate safeguards to ensure the Government could regulate for legitimate public welfare reasons, including public health and national security measures.

Import and export requirements for Korean goods

The New Zealand Customs Service has issued a [reminder](#) to importers, exporters and brokers to take care when lodging an entry to ensure the correct country name has been used for either the Democratic People's Republic of Korea or Republic of Korea, whether it be country of origin, country of destination or country of export.

- Democratic People's Republic of Korea is also known as North Korea
- Republic of Korea is also known as South Korea

New Regulations that come into effect on May 18 explicitly require all imports from or exports to the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (North Korea) to be presented to Customs for inspection ([Regulation 35](#)).

New Zealand, Australia meet on food regulation

New Zealand and Australian Food Regulation Ministers [met in Adelaide on 28 April 2017](#) to discuss a range of food regulation issues, including finalising their investigation into low-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) hemp seeds as a food. They also discussed labelling of sugars and fats and oils.

Low-THC Hemp seeds as a Food

Ministers had requested that the Food Regulation Standing Committee (FRSC) investigate information gaps identified in considering the adoption of low-THC hemp seeds as a food. These covered marketing and labelling issues, legal and Treaty implications, maximum levels of cannabidiol (CBD) and the potential effects on road side drug testing.

Ministers noted the key finding of the Consumption Report is that it is highly unlikely that consumption of food products containing the levels of THC tested would result in any positive tests on oral fluid, blood or urine.

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In light of these findings Ministers supported the draft standard that will allow low-THC hemp seeds to be sold as a food. The standard will take effect six months after it has been gazetted and Ministers acknowledged that there is still a range of New Zealand and State and Territory legislation that currently prohibits the sale of low-THC hemp seeds as a food which will need to be amended. Ministers also supported the establishment of an Implementation and Monitoring working group.

Sugar Labelling

Ministers, at their November 2016 meeting, requested Food Standards Australia New Zealand (FSANZ), in consultation with the FRSC, to prepare a program of work to further investigate labelling approaches to providing information on sugars.

Ministers agreed to the work program that includes further evidence gathering activities by FSANZ on consumer understanding and behaviour, international approaches to sugar labelling, and an update of the policy context by the Australian Government Department of Health, to cover the broader policy context in relation to sugar. That work is expected to be presented at the Forum's next meeting in November 2017.

Fats and Oils

Ministers considered the labelling of specific sources of fats and oils in order to better protect the health and safety of consumers.

In November 2016, Ministers requested that FRSC clarify the policy issue in relation to naming sources of fats and oils to enable consumers to make informed choices in support of the dietary guidelines,

Ministers agreed to extend the scope of this project to cover all parts of the food label, including the identification of all fats and oils and to proceed with the development of regulatory and non regulatory options. The residual issues, such as additional consumer research will also be undertaken as part of this next stage with a progress report to be provided at the next Forum meeting.

Vietnam

Vietnam releases the first draft of Solar Power Purchase Agreement (PPA), but certain key issues remain unresolved for foreign investors and financiers

Following the Prime Minister's issuance of [Decision No. 11](#) adopting the new policy for solar power, the Ministry of Industry and Trade of Vietnam ("MOIT") has released the [first draft of a Circular](#) ("Draft Circular") providing for detailed guidelines on the development of solar power projects in Vietnam. The Draft Circular includes a draft solar power purchase agreement template ("Draft PPA"), as well as detailed guidelines on the formulation and approval of national and provincial solar power development plans. However, the Draft Circular leaves certain key issues unresolved, which may have an impact on the bankability of solar projects, especially for large utility-scale solar power plants.

EU adopts sanctions against further nine people in Democratic Republic of Congo

The European Council has adopted sanctions against nine individuals who hold positions of responsibility in the State administration and in the chain of command of the security forces in the Democratic Republic of the Congo for planning, directing or committing serious human rights violations. This is in addition to the seven people on whom the EU imposed sanctions as of 12 December 2016 due to the obstruction of the electoral process and related human rights violations.

[Decision \(CFSP\) 2017/905](#) and [Council Implementing Regulation \(EU\) 2017/904](#) were published in the [Official Journal](#) of 29 May 2017. The measures take effect immediately, and include a ban on entering the EU, an asset freeze and a prohibition on making funds or economic resources available to the listed individuals.

EU issues list of customs authorities responsible for issuing BTIs

On 19 May 2017, the *Official Journal* published a [list of customs authorities designated by Member States for the purposes of receiving applications, or taking decisions relating to binding tariff information](#), adopted in accordance with Article 11 of [Commission Implementing Regulation \(EU\) 2015/2447](#) [2017/C 157/06].

EU adopts supply chain due diligence obligations for conflict minerals

On 19 May 2017, the *Official Journal* published [Regulation \(EU\) 2017/821 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 17 May 2017 laying down supply chain due diligence obligations for Union importers of tin, tantalum and tungsten, their ores, and gold originating from conflict-affected and high-risk areas](#). This Regulation establishes a Union system for supply chain due diligence ('Union system') in order to curtail opportunities for armed groups and security forces to trade in tin, tantalum and tungsten, their ores, and gold. The Regulation is designed to provide transparency and certainty as regards the supply practices of Union importers, and of smelters and refiners sourcing from conflict-affected and high-risk areas.

The Regulation lays down the supply chain due diligence obligations of Union importers of minerals or metals containing or consisting of tin, tantalum, tungsten or gold, as set out in Annex I to the Regulation. However the Regulation shall not apply to Union importers of minerals or metals where their annual import volume of each of the minerals or metals concerned is below the volume thresholds set out in Annex I. The volume thresholds are set at a level that ensures that the vast majority, but no less than 95 %, of the total volumes imported into the Union of each mineral and metal under the Combined Nomenclature code is subject to the obligations of Union importers set out in this Regulation.

With the exception of Article 7(4), the Regulation shall not apply to recycled metals, nor to stocks where a Union importer demonstrates that those stocks were created in the current form on a verifiable date prior to 1 February 2013

The Regulation requires the Commission to adopt a delegated act, in accordance with Articles 18 and 19, if feasible by 1 April 2020 but no later than 1 July 2020, to amend Annex I by establishing the volume thresholds for tantalum or niobium ores and concentrates, gold ores and concentrates, tin oxides and hydroxides, tantalates and carbides of tantalum, and to amend the existing thresholds every three years after 1 January 2021.

EU grants Sri Lanka GSP+

On 18 May 2017, the *Official Journal* published [Commission Delegated Regulation \(EU\) 2017/836 of 11 January 2017 amending Annex III to Regulation \(EU\) No 978/2012 of the European Parliament and of the Council applying a scheme of generalised tariff preferences](#) which grants GSP+ status to the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka. Article 10(4) of [Regulation \(EU\) No 978/2012](#) of the European Parliament and of the Council of 25 October 2012 permits a beneficiary country under the Generalised Scheme of Tariff Preferences ('GSP') to request to benefit from additional tariff preferences under the special incentive arrangement for sustainable development and good governance (GSP+). For that purpose, Article 9(1) of Regulation (EU) No 978/2012 establishes specific eligibility criteria for the granting of the tariff preferences provided under the GSP+. The country should be considered vulnerable due to a lack of sufficient diversification and insufficient integration with the international trading system. It should have ratified all the conventions listed in Annex VIII to Regulation (EU) No 978/2012 and the most recent available conclusions of the relevant monitoring bodies should not identify a serious failure to effectively implement any of those conventions. In relation to any of the relevant conventions, the country should not have formulated a reservation which is prohibited by the convention or which, for the exclusive purposes of Article 9 of Regulation (EU) No 978/2012, is considered to be incompatible with the object and purpose of that convention. It should accept without reservation the reporting requirements imposed by each convention and give the binding undertakings referred to in points (d), (e) and (f) of Article 9(1) of Regulation (EU) No 978/2012.

The Commission has examined the GSP+ request received on 12 July 2016, from Sri Lanka in accordance with the provisions of Article 10(1) of Regulation

(EU) No 978/2012, and the Commission has established that Sri Lanka meets the conditions. Accordingly, in Annex III to Regulation (EU) No 978/2012, 'Sri Lanka' and the corresponding alphabetical code 'LK' are inserted under columns B and A, respectively.

Commission amends classification of creamed coconut

On 12 May 2017, the *Official Journal* published [Commission Implementing Regulation \(EU\) 2017/803 of 8 May 2017 amending Regulation \(EEC\) No 316/91 concerning the classification of certain goods in the Combined Nomenclature](#).

Item 2 of the Annex to Commission Regulation (EEC) No 316/91 classified a white pasty substance known as 'creamed coconut' which is generally intended for use in the kitchen in the preparation of sauces and other foodstuff and manufactured by fine grinding of coconut pulp and pasteurized, under heading 2008 of the Combined Nomenclature as otherwise prepared nuts, not elsewhere specified or included. Classification of the product under heading 0801 of the Combined Nomenclature was excluded as pasteurisation was not permitted in Chapter 8.

Note 3 a) to Chapter 8 was introduced in the Harmonized System in 1992. It permits a moderate heat treatment for additional preservation or stabilisation of dried nuts of that Chapter. According to the historical documents from the Harmonized System, the term 'pasteurisation' originally proposed in the text of that note was in the end replaced by the more general expression 'moderate heat treatment'. The Explanatory Notes to the Combined Nomenclature of the European Union to Chapter 8 clarified at Union level that pasteurisation is, inter alia, admissible for dried fruits and nuts of that Chapter.

As a consequence, Regulation (EU) 2017/803 deletes item 2 from the table set out in the Annex to Regulation (EEC) No 316/91, in order to avoid potential divergences in tariff classification of desiccated coconut products such as creamed coconut which received a moderate heat treatment and to ensure the uniform application of the Combined Nomenclature within the Union.

Binding Tariff Information

The European Community has created the Binding Tariff Information (BTI) system as a tool to assist economic operators to obtain the correct tariff classification for goods they intend to import or export.

Binding Tariff Information is issued on request to economic operators by the customs authorities of the Member States. It is valid throughout the Community, regardless of the Member State which issued it. For information about an existing BTI, you may want to contact the [customs administration of the Member State](#) which issued it (List updated on 19 May 2017). However, remember that, according to the provisions for data protection, there are limitations as to the information an administration can provide. Italy

The National Anti-corruption Authority approved the new regulation on the vigilance on public contracts

Following the extension of the powers granted to the National Anti-corruption Authority ("ANAC") by the new *Public Procurement Code* (Legislative Decree No. 50/2016), on February 15, 2017 the same Authority amended the Regulation on the vigilance on public contracts (the "Regulation").

The amended Regulation, which entered into force on March 1, 2017, governs the procedure to be followed by the ANAC for the use of its vigilance powers in order to enhance the effectiveness and the strength of said interventions, with particular regard to the prevention and fight against corruption and illegality.

Compared to the well known non-binding recommendation, in case of serious irregularities in the administrative acts, the ANAC now has the power to issue binding recommendations that must be complied with by the awarding authorities within the term established by the same Authority which in any case shall not exceed 60 days. In case of non-compliance, the responsible manager of the awarding authority shall be subject to a pecuniary fine of between EUR 250 and EUR 25,000. The fine shall also have an impact on the reputational system of the awarding authority.

To balance such a significant power, both awarding authorities and the other parties to the proceeding are granted the right to take part in the verification procedure, to access the relevant documents and to submit statements or written observations during the investigation phase.

The vigilance procedure can be started ex-officio by the same Authority or following a report from a third party. In this latter case, the report must be submitted by filling out a form available on the ANAC website. Reports made by administrative judges and those having criminal and/or economic and social relevance are treated as a priority.

In case there are no interpretative uncertainties or if the ANAC has already issued an opinion in a similar case, the responsible manager of the Authority can initiate a simplified procedure without carrying out any investigation.

Russian Federation

Russia partially lifts foreign trade sanctions against Turkey

On May 31, 2017 the Russian President signed a Decree on repeal of a number of foreign trade measures against Turkey ("Decree"). The Decree repeals the following prohibitions:

1. Prohibition to provide certain services and the perform certain types of works by Turkish companies, or companies controlled by Turkish persons. Particularly, the prohibition applied to construction of buildings, engineering installations and specialized construction works; activities in the sphere of architecture, design and engineering; technical tests, research and analysis, activities of touristic agencies and other organizations providing services in the touristic sphere; hotel business and other places for temporary accommodation; provision of works and services for state and municipal needs; processing of wood.
2. Prohibition for Russian legal entities to employ Turkish nationals.
3. The Decree partially lifts travel ban for Turkish citizens and allows visits to Russia for members of aircraft crew teams, as well as civil servants and members of their families visiting Russia on short-term business trips under civil service passports or diplomatic passports.

Turkish citizens travelling with ordinary passports must obtain a Russian visa (i.e., except for diplomats and persons entering Russia under temporary live/work permits).

The Decree includes instructions for the Russian Government to introduce relevant amendments into respective implementing regulations, but does not establish any time lines for this task.

The Decree was issued a week after the meeting between Governments of Russia and Turkey when it was agreed to uplift mutual restrictions in foreign trade between these 2 countries (i.e., on May 22, 2017). [See article below]

The Decree is silent regarding the remaining import ban on food products originating from Turkey, which has also been expected to be partially lifted after the above mentioned meeting between Russia and Turkey on May 22, 2017.

Russia and Turkey agree to lift mutual foreign trade sanctions

On May 22, 2017 the Governments of Russia and Turkey signed a statement on uplifting of mutual restrictions in foreign trade. Relevant document was signed by Deputy Prime Minister of the Russian Government Mr. A. Dvorkovich and Deputy Prime Minister of the Turkish Government Mr. Mehmet Simsek.

There have been no official documents issued yet. According to official statements of the Russian Government, in order to start implementing the above agreement, Russia has been waiting for relevant steps to be made by Turkey first (i.e., Turkey applies certain limitations in trade toward Russia).

Russia imposed foreign trade restriction against Turkey back in November 2015. Currently Russia applies a food product import ban for certain specifically listed items of food products origination from Turkey and maintains restrictions in the sphere of labor for Turkish citizens (subject to certain exceptions) and provision of certain specifically listed works and services for companies that are under Turkish jurisdiction (e.g., construction, architecture, public procurement, etc.).

According to official statements in press, Russia and Turkey could still maintain certain limitations in mutual trade (particularly, Russia would likely preserve import limitations for certain food products, including tomatoes).

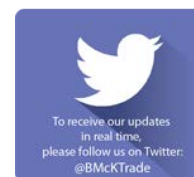
