### Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP)

#### TPP Agreement signed

On February 4, 2016, in Auckland, New Zealand the Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement (TPP) was signed by representatives of the 12 countries that had negotiated the agreement: Australia, Brunei, Canada, Chile, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, Singapore, the United States and Vietnam. The ministers who signed the agreement issued the following statement:

We, the Ministers representing Australia, Brunei Darussalam, Canada, Chile, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, Singapore, United States, and Vietnam, are pleased to announce that we have today signed the Trans-Pacific Partnership agreement.

After more than five years of negotiations, we are honoured to be able to formalise our collective agreement of TPP which represents an historic achievement for the Asia-Pacific region.

TPP will set a new standard for trade and investment in one of the world's fastest growing and most dynamic regions. We signatories comprise nearly 40 percent of

global GDP, a market of more than 800 million people, and around one third of world trade. Our goal is to enhance shared prosperity, create jobs and promote sustainable economic development for all of our nations.

The signing of the agreement signals an important milestone and the beginning of the next phase for TPP. Our focus now turns to the completion of our respective domestic processes.

The TPP must now go through domestic ratification or accession procedures in each country.

## The Americas - Central America and Caribbean

### Cuba

#### Cuba and U.S. to restore commercial air service

On February 16, 2016, the U.S. and Cuban governments [announced](#) that the two countries have signed an arrangement that provides for the re-establishment of scheduled air services between the United States and Cuba. The new arrangement will facilitate visits for travelers that fall under [one of 12 categories authorized](#) by the U.S. Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control. There have been no scheduled flights between the United States and Cuba for over half a century.

Immediately following the signing, the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) issued an Order that invited U.S. air carriers to [apply for an allocation](#) of the new opportunities to provide scheduled passenger and cargo flights for the expected 110 daily flights to Cuba and expects to award the routes by summer. It is understood that the agreement allows 20 regular daily U.S. flights to Havana, in addition to the current 10-15 charter flights a day. The rest would be to other Cuban cities as the arrangement provides each country with the opportunity to operate up to 10 daily roundtrip flights between the United States and each of Cuba's nine other international airports. The arrangement does not limit charter services, meaning that no DOT allocation procedures are needed and charter flights can continue as before.

The DOT Order initiates a proceeding for DOT to select which U.S. carriers will be able to offer scheduled flights to Cuba, and from which U.S. points. In making its selection, the Department said it will consider which proposals will offer and maintain the best service to the traveling and shipping public. DOT's order states that applications are due March 2, 2016; answers to applications are due March 14, 2016; and replies to those answers are due March 21, 2016. ## The Americas - North America

### Canada

#### Canada relaxes sanctions targeting Iran

On February 5, 2016, the Government of Canada [announced changes](#) to its comprehensive economic and trade sanctions against Iran. The changes signal Canada’s willingness to re-engage in dialogue with Iran and follow the International Atomic Energy Agency’s announcement, on January 16, 2016, that Iran had fulfilled all necessary commitments under the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA). January 16, 2016 is known as “Implementation Day”. On that date, the United Nations Security Council (“UNSC”), in accordance with [Resolution 2231](#), repealed certain previous UNSC resolutions on Iran, and the European Union, Switzerland, and the United States relaxed their trade sanctions on Iran.

Canada imposes trade sanctions against Iran under the *Special Economic Measures Act* (SEMA) and, in accordance with UNSC resolutions, under the *United Nations Act* (UN Act). With respect to Iran, the February 5, 2016 changes amend both the *Special Economic Measures (Iran) Regulations* (SEMA Regulations) and the *Regulations Implementing the United Nations Resolutions on Iran* (UN Regulations). While it may appear that Iran is now “open for business”, we caution that significant restrictions to trade with Iran remain in place and both individuals and organizations continue to face significant compliance risks. Before

engaging in any new activities involving Iran or Iranian parties, companies should carefully consider the restrictions that remain in place.

Below, we provide additional information about the changes adopted by Canada on February 5, 2016.

### Expanded Jurisdiction

Before February 5, 2016, both the SEMA Regulations and UN Regulations applied to: (i) all persons in Canada, regardless of nationality; and (ii) Canadians outside Canada. “Canadian” was defined as “a person who is a citizen within the meaning of the *Citizenship Act* or a body corporate incorporated or continued by or under the laws of Canada or of a province.”

On February 5, 2016, the jurisdiction of the UN Regulations was expanded. The definition of “Canadian” under the UN Regulations now includes not only Canadian citizens and corporations, but also permanent residents as defined in subsection 2(1) of the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act*. There was no corresponding change made to the definition of “Canadian” under the SEMA Regulations.

This change to the definition of “Canadian” may require fresh consideration by companies of whether any employees holding Canadian permanent resident status are subject to the UN Regulations. We note that an individual who has permanent resident status, as defined in the UN Regulations, continues to have permanent resident status even if they are physically located outside Canada.

### Scope of Prohibited Activities

Amendments have been made to the SEMA Regulations and UN Regulations to significantly reduce the scope of prohibited activities. Generally speaking, the amendments bring Canadian trade sanctions in line with the EU sanctions legislation and the US sanctions legislation, that is, the Canadian restrictions that remain in force are focused on nuclear-related activity, Iran’s ballistic missile activities, and dealings with certain named individuals and entities (known as designated persons or listed persons).

#### 1. SEMA Regulations

Previously, the SEMA Regulations imposed broad restrictions on almost all trade and economic activity related to Iran, including broad restrictions on financial services related to Iran, importing, purchasing or acquiring goods from Iran, exporting, selling or shipping goods to Iran, and making investments in Iranian entities.

The amended SEMA Regulations have repealed many of the broad restrictions relating to Iran, including the trade embargo, the prohibitions on providing or obtaining financial services, and investing in Iranian entities. However, the broad trade embargo has been replaced by a prohibition on trade in certain listed goods and technology. These are generally goods and technology with potential nuclear or military applications. The SEMA Regulations also continue to prohibit facilitation activity, that is, causing, facilitating or assisting, or intending to cause, facilitate or assist, any act or thing that is prohibited thereunder.

In addition, the list of named persons under the SEMA Regulations (previously defined as “designated persons” but now referred to under the SEMA Regulations



as “listed persons”) has been shortened, but remains significant. Where there were previously over 500 entities and 83 individuals listed, there are now 161 entities and 41 individuals. The broad prohibition on almost all dealings with listed persons means that companies continue to face significant compliance risks if they are not thorough in screening potential suppliers, customers, or partners against the listed persons list.

## 2. UN Regulations

The UN Regulations implement into Canadian law the UNSC resolutions imposed against Iran that focus on Iran nuclear-related activities.

Canada has [amended](#) the UN Regulations in accordance with the changes made to the UNSC resolutions on Iran on Implementation Day. The UN Regulations continue to impose prohibitions on trade in specific products and technologies related to nuclear or military applications, goods and technology related to ballistic missiles, as well as making available property or providing financial or related services related to uranium mining in Canada, or to the production or use of certain nuclear materials and technology in Canada. The UN Regulations also continue to prohibit facilitation activity, that is, causing, facilitating or assisting, or intending to cause, facilitate or assist, any act or thing that is prohibited thereunder.

The designated persons subject to the UN Regulations are those found on the list published by the UNSC pursuant to UNSC Resolution 2231. As with the SEMA Regulations discussed above, the broad prohibition in the UN Regulations on almost all dealings with designated persons means that companies continue to face significant compliance risks if they are not thorough in screening potential suppliers, customers, or partners against the designated persons list.

## Export Controls / Export Permits

Pursuant to the *Export and Import Permits Act*, an exporter may apply to the Export Controls Division of Global Affairs Canada for a permit to export items listed on the Export Control List. In its announcement on February 5, 2016, the Government of Canada also issued a [Notice to Exporters](#) indicating that while all applications for export permits for controlled goods and technology destined to Iran will be considered on a case-by-case basis, permit applications to export to Iran certain items on the Export Control List will normally be denied. Items that will normally be denied export permits to Iran include, in part, all items in Group 2 (Munitions List), Group 3 (Nuclear Non-Proliferation List), Group 4 (Nuclear-Related Dual-Use List), and certain items in the remaining groups, including, for example, telecommunications intercept, surveillance and jamming equipment (Group 1, Dual-Use), certain nuclear and military items (Group 5, Miscellaneous Goods and Technology), and certain toxic chemicals and biological weapon agents (Group 7, Chemical and Biological Weapons Non-Proliferation List).

## Mexico

### Mexico amends the list of exports that require permits

On February 9, 2016, the Ministry of Economy published in the *Diario Oficial de la Federación* (the Official Gazette) an [Acuerdo](#) which adds to, or modifies, the list of conventional weapons, their parts and components, dual-use goods, software and technologies susceptible to diversion for the manufacture and proliferation of conventional weapons and weapons of mass destruction, for which export permits are required from the Ministry of Economy.

The amendments and modifications include certain types of agitators, protective footwear for use in biological, radioactive or chemical warfare agents, certain furnaces, incinerators. See the Acuerdo for the complete list with tariff numbers and descriptions.

## President modifies national emergency with respect to Cuba

On February 25, 2016, the *Federal Register* published [Proclamation 9398—Modifying and Continuing the National Emergency With Respect to Cuba and Continuing To Authorize the Regulation of the Anchorage and Movement of Vessels](#) which modifies and continues the national emergency declared in Proclamation 6867 of March 1, 1996, and expanded by Proclamation 7757 of February 26, 2004 because the descriptions of the national emergency set forth in those Proclamations no longer reflect the international relations of the United States related to Cuba.

The proclamation directs the Secretary of Homeland Security (the “Secretary”) to make rules and regulations governing the anchorage and movement of any vessel, foreign or domestic, in the territorial waters of the United States, which may be used, or is susceptible of being used, for voyage into Cuban territorial waters and that may create unsafe conditions, or result in unauthorized transactions, and thereby threaten a disturbance of international relations. Any rule or regulation issued pursuant to this proclamation may be effective immediately upon issuance as such rule or regulation shall involve a foreign affairs function of the United States.

The Secretary is authorized, to the extent consistent with international law, to inspect any vessel, foreign or domestic, in the territorial waters of the United States, at any time; to place guards on any such vessel; and, take full possession and control of any such vessel and remove the officers and crew and all other persons not specifically authorized by the Secretary to go or remain on board the vessel when necessary to secure the rights and obligations of the United States.

The Secretary is authorized to request assistance from such departments, agencies, officers, or instrumentalities of the United States as the Secretary deems necessary to carry out the purposes of the proclamation. Such departments, agencies, officers, or instrumentalities shall, consistent with other provisions of law and to the extent practicable, provide requested assistance.

The Secretary may seek assistance from State and local authorities in carrying out the purposes of the proclamation. Because State and local assistance may be essential for an effective response to this emergency, the President urges all State and local officials to cooperate with Federal authorities and to take all actions within their lawful authority necessary to prevent the unauthorized departure of vessels intending to enter Cuban territorial waters.

The Secretary is authorized to delegate all powers and authorities in the proclamation to other officers and agents of the United States Government unless otherwise prohibited by law. Any provisions of Proclamation 6867 of March 1, 1996, and expanded by Proclamation 7757 of February 26, 2004, that are inconsistent with the provisions of the proclamation are superseded to the extent of such inconsistency.

## President extends national emergency with respect to Libya

On February 24, 2016, the *Federal Register* published Presidential [Notice of February 22, 2016 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to Libya](#), which extends the measures first established by Executive Order (EO) 13566 (February 25, 2011) for an additional year. In EO 13396, the President declared a national emergency, to deal with the unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States constituted by the actions of Colonel Muammar Qadhafi, his government, and close associates, who took extreme measures against the people of Libya, including by using weapons of war, mercenaries, and wanton violence against unarmed civilians. In addition, there was a serious risk that Libyan state assets would be misappropriated by Qadhafi, members of his government, members of his family, or his close associates if those assets were not protected. The foregoing circumstances, the prolonged attacks, and the increased numbers of Libyans seeking refuge in other countries caused a deterioration in the security of Libya and posed a serious risk to its stability.

The measures are being extended for an additional year because the situation in Libya continues to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States, and it is necessary to protect against the diversion of assets or other abuse by certain members of Qadhafi's family and other former regime officials.

## New North Korean sanctions signed into law

On February 18, 2016, the President signed into law the [North Korea Sanctions and Policy Enhancement Act of 2016](#) (Pub. L. 114-122; 130 stat. 93) (the "NKSPEA"), which passed Congress by an overwhelming majority in the U.S. House of Representatives and a unanimous vote in the U.S. Senate. NKSPEA sets out several new sanctions against North Korea, including the following:

1. **Blocking of the Government of North Korea:** Section 104(c) of NKSPEA requires imposition of a "blocking" order (*i.e.*, asset freeze) against the Government of North Korea, the Workers' Party of Korea, and certain persons designated pursuant to Section 104(a) and (b) of NKSPEA (as well as persons determined to be owned or controlled by, or acting on behalf of, any of the foregoing). As a result, all property or interests in property of such persons would be blocked (or "frozen") if it comes within the United States or the possession or control of a US person. US persons are broadly prohibited from dealing with blocked persons, whether directly or indirectly.
2. **Additional Designation Requirements and Authorities:** Section 104(a) of NKSPEA requires designation of persons determined to have knowingly engaged in certain targeted activities, including, but not limited to:
  - Importing or exporting controlled goods, services or technology to or from North Korea for WMD proliferation purposes;
  - Facilitating human rights abuses or censorship by the Government of North Korea;
  - Engaging in significant activities undermining cybersecurity against foreign persons on behalf of the Government of North Korea; or
  - Selling, supplying or transferring a significant amount of precious metal, graphite, raw or semi-finished metals or aluminum, steel, coal or software, for WMD proliferation or other targeted uses.

Section 104(b) allows for discretionary designation of UN-sanctioned parties or parties contributing to bribery or misappropriation of public funds. Persons designated under Section 104(a) or (b) would be subject to the blocking restrictions described above and



likely added to the List of Specially Designated Nationals and Blocked Persons (“SDN List”).

**3. Government Procurement Ban:** In addition to the blocking requirements, Section 204(a) of NKSPEA imposes a government procurement and contracting ban on any person designated under Section 104(a).

**4. Potential Designation as a “Jurisdiction of Primary Money Laundering Concern”:** Section 201(b) on NKSPEA requires the administration to determine whether there are reasonable grounds to designate North Korea as a “jurisdiction of primary money laundering concern.” This designation would block North Korean access to the US financial system and require the imposition of “special measures” against designated financial institutions.

**5. Export Licensing Requirement:** Section 203(a) of NKSPEA imposes a new export licensing requirement for all items classified on the US Commerce Control List for anti-terrorism (AT) reasons. This requirement has limited effects beyond existing export controls, which impose a licensing requirement for almost all exports to North Korea of items “subject to US jurisdiction,” (*i.e.*, of US origin, exported from the United States, or containing more than 10% controlled US content), except for uncontrolled (*i.e.*, EAR99) food or medicine. The effect of this new requirement is to remove the availability of certain license exceptions for various categories of AT-controlled exports, including humanitarian donations, personal baggage, and news media equipment. Such exports now require a validated license. There is an exception to this requirement for the “*provision of assistance for human rights, democracy, rule of law, or emergency humanitarian purposes.*”

With the exception of the procurement ban under Section 204, the sanctions above are subject to a waiver authority set out in Section 208 for humanitarian assistance, *i.e.*, “*assistance to meet humanitarian needs, including needs for food, medicine, medical supplies, clothing, and shelter*” or for certain human rights purposes. This waiver must be affirmatively exercised by the President to be effective, and it is unclear at this time how specific or broad this waiver must be with respect to particular activities or organizations.

## President continues national emergency with respect to Côte d’Ivoire

On February 5, 2016, the *Federal Register* published Presidential [Notice of February 3, 2016 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to the Situation in or in Relation to Côte d’Ivoire](#) which extends the measures first established in Executive Order (EO) 13396 (February 7, 2006) for an additional year. In EO 13396, the President declared a national emergency, to deal with the unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States constituted by the situation in or in relation to Côte d’Ivoire and ordered related measures blocking the property of certain persons contributing to the conflict in Côte d’Ivoire. The situation in or in relation to Côte d’Ivoire, which has been addressed by several UN Security Council Resolutions, has resulted in the massacre of large numbers of civilians, widespread human rights abuses, significant political violence and unrest, and fatal attacks against international peacekeeping forces.

The national emergency is being extended because, while the Government of Côte d’Ivoire and its people continue to make progress towards consolidating democratic gains and peace and prosperity, the situation in or in relation to Côte d’Ivoire continues to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States.

## President signs 'Customs Bill' into law

On February 24, 2016, President Obama signed [\*Trade Facilitation and Trade Enforcement Act of 2015\*](#) (the Act) and it became Pub. L. 114-125. This 160 page bipartisan Act is the first real Customs modernization legislation in nearly two decades. On February 11, 2016, the U.S. Senate, by a vote of 75-20 adopted the Conference Report the Act, which is more commonly referred to as the "Customs Re-authorization Bill" or the "Customs Bill," after a cloture vote. The Conference Report passed the U.S. House of Representatives in a 256-158 roll-call vote in December 2015, but was stalled in the Senate over a non-customs related internet tax issue that had been added during the House and Senate Conference which had to reconcile different versions of the original bill that passed each House last year.

Although the Act officially authorizes various ongoing CBP programs (such as ACE/ITDS, risk assessment, CEEs, NIPRCC, partnership programs – such as C-TPAT and CSI, etc.), it also contains information sharing requirements with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and other Federal Agencies, establishes agency priorities, training requirements (including the use of non-government persons), Congressional reporting requirements, performance standards and enforcement provisions. It also contains many substantive legal requirements that will impact importers, customs brokers and intellectual property rights owners, including:

- The establishment of an importer of record program with sufficient information to identify linkages and criteria to determine changes in organization structure;.
- The establishment of an importer risk assessment program to adjust bond amounts and increase or decrease screening of imports;
- The establishment of an interagency Import Safety Working Group;
- Mandating regulations to require customs brokers to establish programs to verify the identity of their importer clients to CBP and require brokers to maintain records collected by the broker concerning the importer's identity;
- An amendment to the Tariff Act of 1930 [new Section 628A] to permit CBP to share unredacted samples and packaging materials (including labels) of goods bearing recorded trademarks or recorded copyrighted material (and devices for circumvention) with intellectual property rights holders (unless it would compromise an ongoing law enforcement investigation or national security) to assist Customs and Border Protection in determining whether they are counterfeit;
- An amendment to section 596 of the Tariff Act of 1930 to allow the seizure of technology, services, products, device, components (or parts thereof) used to circumvent protections [see 17 U.S.C. §1201];
- Provisions to enforce copyrights that are pending with the Copyright Office;
- Improved enforcement of antidumping and countervailing duty (AD/CVD) laws with the establishment of a new Trade Remedy Law Enforcement Division to address AD/CVD duty evasion and a new section 517 of the Tariff Act of 1930 establishing investigative procedures. In addition, the Act eliminates the current option for importers of merchandise subject to AD/CV duties from a "new shipper" currently under review to post a bond rather than pay a cash deposit of estimated duties.;
- The Act requires the establishment of a honey transshipment database;
- Increased enforcement of illicitly imported, exported or trafficked cultural property, fish, wildlife or plants;
- Establishment of a Trade Enforcement Trust Fund;

- Elimination of the consumptive demand exception to 19 U.S.C. §1307 (ban on imports of goods made with forced or prison labor);
- Clarification in 19 U.S.C. §1501 that CBP reliquidations must be made within 90 days of original liquidation date, not notice of the liquidation;
- Changes in classification and duty rates for recreational performance outerwear and protective active footwear imports to correct several drafting errors to the trade preferences legislation passed in June 2015 that changed certain tariff classifications and significantly increased (from 4% to 27.7% and from 20 to 37.5%) the tariff rates. Under the Act, these products will still have separate tariff classifications, but their general duty rates will return to their original level;
- Trade assistance and tariff preferences for Nepal;
- Authorizes U.S. to join APEC countries in certain environmental goods tariff reductions;
- Changes in country of origin marking for certain castings;
- Increase administrative duty free entry from \$200 to \$800;
- Amend heading 9802, HTS;
- Exemption from duty for residue bulk cargo in Instruments of International Traffic (IITs) exported previously;
- Drawback revisions (substitution by 8 digit HTS number, recordkeeping and documentation, revision of amounts from 99% to refund based on formula.
- Export promotion, state programs and small business provisions

Details of the various changes will be covered in future Updates.

## USTR requests Peru timber verification

On February 26, 2016, the U.S. Trade Representative [announced](#) that it has requested the Government of Peru to verify that a 2015 timber shipment exported to the United States from Peru complied with all applicable Peruvian laws and regulations. This is the first such [verification request](#) under the *United States-Peru Trade Promotion Agreement* (PTPA), which entered into force in 2009. The timber verification provision is a monitoring tool provided for in the PTPA to ensure enforcement of Peruvian forestry laws throughout the supply chain, so that U.S. timber importers and consumers can be confident that the timber they buy from Peru is legally harvested and exported.

The U.S. and Peru have an active record of engagement to monitor implementation of obligations under the PTPA Environment Chapter and Forest annex. The Forest Annex has catalyzed meaningful reform in Peru's forestry sector since its entry into force, including Peru's actions to:

- establish key forest sector institutions, such as an independent forestry oversight body - Organismo de Supervisión de los Recursos Forestales y de Fauna Silvestre (OSINFOR) - which has performed over 600 supervisions of 2.0 million hectares during 2014 alone, resulting in thousands of resolutions to sanction illegal activity or mandate corrective actions to improve forest management;
- amend its criminal code to include substantial penalties for illegal logging and wildlife trafficking;
- adopt laws and other measures necessary to comply with the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES); and
- enact a new Forestry and Wildlife Law and implementing regulations that improve forest sector governance.

## USTR seeks comments on 2015/2016 GSP review

On February 29, 2016, the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) announcing the availability of full 2015 calendar year import statistics relating to competitive need limitations (CNLs) under the *Generalized System of Preferences* (GSP) program. The USTR will accept public comments submitted by April 1, 2016, regarding: (1) Possible de minimis CNL waivers; and (2) possible redesignations of articles currently not eligible for GSP benefits because they previously exceeded the CNL thresholds. The notice also announces the withdrawal by the petitioners of certain previously accepted CNL waiver petitions.

## U.S. and Laos sign TIFA

On February 18, 2016, the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) website [announced](#) that the U.S. Trade Representative and the Lao Minister of Industry and Commerce signed a bilateral *Trade and Investment Framework Agreement*. This agreement creates a forum for the United States and Laos to engage on bilateral trade and investment issues, such as intellectual property, labor, environment, and capacity building; as well as to coordinate on multilateral and regional issues, including related to the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN).

## ITC provides schedule for 2016 U.S. Services Trade report, opportunity to provide input

On February 4, 2016, the U.S. International Trade Commission (ITC) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) [Investigation No. 332–345] providing the schedule for the 2016 Report on *Recent Trends in U.S. Services Trade*, and providing an opportunity to submit information. The 2016 report, which the ITC plans to publish in September 2016, will provide aggregate data on cross-border trade in services for the period ending in 2014, and transactions by affiliates based outside the country of their parent firm for the period ending in 2013. The report's analysis will focus on financial services (banking, insurance, and securities services). The ITC is inviting interested members of the public to furnish information and views in connection with the 2016 report. The deadline for filing written submissions is March 30, 2016. The anticipated date for publishing the report is September 30, 2016. The ITC has prepared and published annual reports in this series under investigation No. 332–345, *Recent Trends in U.S. Services Trade*, since 1996.

## European Commission and US Authorities reach agreement on Transatlantic data flows

After months of intense negotiations, the European Commission and the US Government announced today an [agreement on the EU-US Privacy Shield](#). This new arrangement replaces the US-EU Safe Harbor Privacy Arrangement (“Safe Harbor”), which was struck down by the Court of Justice of the European Union on October 6, 2015. The EU-US Privacy Shield builds upon the original Safe Harbor, and establishes a range of additional protections for European personal data, particularly on the issues of public authority access to data. The new arrangement is a critical achievement to help assure continuity of transatlantic data flows, which are vital to the digital economies in both Europe and the United States. The negotiators on both sides of the Atlantic should be praised for this achievement as it is a “win-win” for data protection and the transatlantic digital economy.

### What are the requirements of the new EU-US Privacy Shield?

Although the details of the arrangement still require further study, key features appear to include:

#### 1. Clear safeguards and transparency obligations on US government access

US authorities have, for the first time, given written assurances to their European counterparts that law enforcement and national security access to personal data will be subject to clear limitations, safeguards, and oversight mechanisms to assure proportionality and necessity. There will be an annual joint review of the arrangement, including the national security access issue.

#### 2. Strong obligations on companies handling Europeans’ personal data and robust enforcement

Under the Privacy Shield, US recipients of personal data from the EU will be required to commit to robust obligations on how personal data is processed and individual rights are guaranteed. The US Department of Commerce will monitor that companies publish their commitments to the Privacy Shield, and will otherwise assure application of enforcement authority by the US Federal Trade Commission under US law.

#### 3. Effective protection of EU citizens’ rights with several redress possibilities

Any EU citizen who considers that their personal data has been misused under the new arrangement will have several redress possibilities. European Data Protection Authorities can refer complaints to the US Department of Commerce and the Federal Trade Commission. There will be deadlines for responding to complaints, and alternative dispute resolution will be free of charge. In addition, a new Ombudsperson will be created within the US Department of State to handle complaints about national intelligence authority access to European personal data.

### What are the next steps?

The European Commission will prepare a draft adequacy decision for the arrangement, which could then be adopted following consultation with the Article 31 committee of Member State representatives, and after obtaining the advice of the Article 29 Working Party of data protection authorities. On the US side, the US authorities will in the meantime proceed to take the necessary steps to formalize their commitments in writing. The European Commission has expressed its hope that these procedures can be completed within three (3) months, and it is expected that US companies participating in Safe Harbor will have some time to decide whether to join the new arrangement. In the meantime, companies should continue to pursue appropriate data transfer and data processing agreements and monitor updates from data protection authorities regarding transition periods and enforcement of existing laws.

## CBP opens Global Entry to German citizens

On February 16, 2016, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a [general notice](#) [CBP Dec. No. 16–04] announcing that CBP is concluding a limited pilot program (established in 2013) through which certain citizens of Germany were eligible to apply for participation in its Global Entry program and expanding eligibility in the program to include all German citizens. Additionally, the notice announces that certain U.S. citizens may apply for membership in EasyPASS, Germany’s registered traveler program. CBP has established the Global Entry international trusted traveler program at most major U.S. airports. Global Entry allows preapproved participants dedicated CBP processing into the United States using Global Entry kiosks located at designated airports.

The effective date was applications from German citizens was February 16, 2016.

## CBP modifies PGA message set for toxic substances requiring EPA certification

On February 10, 2016, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a [general notice](#) announcing CBP’s plan to modify the National Customs Automation Program (NCAP) test concerning the transmission of electronic filings of data to the Automated Commercial Environment (ACE), known as the Partner Government Agency (PGA) Message Set test. This modification expands the use of the ACE PGA Message Set for the transmission of Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) *Toxic Substances Control Act* (TSCA) certification data. CBP invites public comment concerning the test program.

The modified PGA Message Set test will commence no earlier than February 10, 2016, and will continue until concluded by way of announcement in the *Federal Register*. Comments will be accepted through the duration of the test.

## EPA makes changes in reporting and recordkeeping for ozone depleting imports and exports for ITDS

On February 9, 2016, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) published in the *Federal Register* a [direct final rule](#) [EPA-HQ-OAR-2015-0309; FRL-9941-82-OAR] on minor conforming edits to the stratospheric protection regulations to implement the International Trade Data System. This system allows businesses to transmit the transactional data required by multiple Federal agencies for the import and export of cargo through a single “window.” As businesses currently must submit trade data to multiple agencies, in multiple ways, and often on paper, the transition to electronic filing is expected to save businesses time and money. Specifically, this rule removes the requirement that the petition for used ozone depleting substances accompany the shipment through U.S. Customs and removes references to Customs forms that are obsolete under the new system.

The rule is effective on May 9, 2016 without further notice, unless EPA receives adverse comment by March 10, 2016. If EPA receives adverse comment, EPA will publish a timely withdrawal in the *Federal Register* informing the public that the rule will not take effect.



EPA also published a separate document that will serve as the [proposed rule](#) to make the edits if adverse comments are received on the direct final rule. Written comments must be received by March 10, 2016. If EPA receives no adverse comment, it will not take further action on this proposed rule. If EPA receives adverse comment, it will withdraw the direct final rule and it will not take effect. EPA would address all public comments in any subsequent final rule based on this proposed rule.

### CBP solicits comments on domestic party petition re: tariff classification of a steel tubing fitting

On February 9, 2016, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) [USCBP-2016-0007] soliciting comments on a petition submitted on behalf of a domestic interested party (pursuant to 19 U.S.C. § 1516 and 19 C.F.R. § 175.21) requesting the reclassification under the *Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States* (HTSUS) of a steel tube fitting from Taiwan. CBP classified the steel tube fitting under subheading 7307.99.50, HTSUS, which provides for: “Tube or pipe fittings (for example, couplings, elbows, sleeves), of iron or steel: Other: Other: Other.” The 2015 column one, general rate of duty is 4.3 percent ad valorem. Petitioner contends that the proper classification for the steel tube fitting is under subheading 8412.90.90, HTSUS, which provides for: “Other engines and motors, and parts thereof: Parts: Other.” Petitioner asserts that some of its competitors are classifying all or a substantial portion of similar fittings as parts of hydraulic systems, under subheading 8412.90.90, HTSUS, which is duty free, thus placing Petitioner at a competitive disadvantage. The document invites comments with regard to the correctness of the current classification by CBP. Comments must be received on or before April 11, 2016.

### CBP publishes quarterly interest rates

On February 8, 2016, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) advising the public that the quarterly Internal Revenue Service interest rates used to calculate interest on overdue accounts (underpayments) and refunds (overpayments) of customs duties remain unchanged from the previous quarter. For the calendar quarter beginning January 1, 2016, the interest rates for overpayments will be 2 percent for corporations and 3 percent for non-corporations, and the interest rate for underpayments will be 3 percent for both corporations and non-corporations. Effective: January 1, 2016

## CBP announces ACE as sole system for electronic entry and entry summary filings

On February 29, 2016, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) announcing that the Commercial Environment (ACE) will be the sole electronic data interchange (EDI) system authorized by the Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) for processing certain electronic entry and entry summary filings as of the effective dates of this notice. As of the effective dates of this notice, ACE will be the sole CBP-authorized EDI system for merchandise subject only to the import requirements of CBP and also to the *Lacey Act* import requirements of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), or the import requirements of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), or the import requirements of both APHIS (Lacey) and NHTSA, as well as CBP. This document also announces that the Automated Commercial System (ACS) will no longer be a CBP authorized EDI system for purposes of processing the electronic filings specified in the notice. This document further announces the conclusion of the ACE/International Trade Data System (ITDS) pilots for APHIS (Lacey) and NHTSA. Electronic entry and entry summary filings for merchandise subject to the import requirements of other Partner Government Agencies (PGAs) can be submitted in ACE pursuant to an ongoing PGA pilot, or in ACS, until further notice.

Effective March 31, 2016: ACE will be the sole CBP-authorized EDI system for:

- Electronic entry summaries for merchandise that is subject only to the import requirements of CBP, associated with the following entry types: 01 (consumption), 03 (consumption— antidumping/countervailing duty), 11 (informal), 23 (temporary importation under bond), 51 (Defense Contract Administration Service Region), and 52 (government—dutiable); and
- electronic entries and corresponding entry summaries associated with the above entry types, for merchandise subject to the *Lacey Act* import requirements of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), or to the import requirements of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), and no other PGA requirements. Effective May 28, 2016: ACE will be the sole CBP-authorized EDI system for:
- electronic entries for merchandise that is subject only to the import requirements of CBP, associated with the following entry types: 01 (consumption), 03 (consumption— antidumping/countervailing duty), 11 under bond, 51 (Defense Contract Administration Service Region), and 52 (government—dutiable); and
- electronic entries and corresponding entry summaries associated with entry type 06 (consumption—foreign trade zone), for merchandise that is subject only to the import requirements of CBP; or for merchandise subject to the import requirements of APHIS (*Lacey Act*) or NHTSA, and no other PGA requirements.

## CBP assesses automation of USVI trade entry process

On February 2, 2016, CBP [announced](#) that it continues to assess a viable way to incorporate the U.S. Virgin Islands (USVI) into the Automated Commercial Environment (ACE) to expedite the importation process.

San Juan Field Office Assistant Director for Trade, Edward Ryan, and ACE Single Window Director, Stephen Hilsen, recently visited the Area Port of St. Thomas to gather information about the current cargo clearance process in the USVI in which all custom entries are made by Customs Business Service companies (“filers”) and/or importers in person.

The current process lacks electronic communication from the filers to CBP, hence, a heavy paper environment is created in all USVI ports of entry.

CBP also visited local USVI customs business service companies to gather information about the needs of the trade community that can improve and facilitate the customs declaration process. Automation would also make CBP more efficient and provide better support to CBP's partner government agencies.

CBP requirements in the USVI are unique because it operates under the Danish Public Law 64; a law that remains in effect since 1914, when the Danes sold the islands to the U.S. Federal statutes require CBP to collect customs duties on behalf of the USVI.

## CBP issues guidance on recordkeeping under ACE

U.S. Customs and Border Protection has posted [\*Guidance on Recordkeeping in the Automated Commercial Environment \(ACE\)\*](#) on its website. The guidance, which is dated January 28, 2016, states:

**Summary:** As a matter of policy, CBP will not request an entry filer to produce the data (formerly contained in CBP Forms 7501, 3461, 214 or 7512) that the filer previously transmitted to and was retained by CBP unless CBP has a need for such records. If CBP needs such records, the filer may re-transmit or otherwise provide the data electronically or reproduce the entry/entry summary data using an ACE report.

**Limitations:** The following CBP recordkeeping guidance is for entries/entry summaries and FTZ admissions filed in ACE. Note that supporting documentation that was used to create the data transmitted to CBP must be maintained by the filer and is not covered by this recordkeeping guidance regardless of whether the entry or FTZ admission was filed in ACE or ACS. Moreover, original documents must be retained by the entry filer and produced to CBP upon demand even if a digital copy of the original document was previously transmitted electronically to CBP. This guidance does not apply to or impact in any way the recordkeeping requirements or entry/entry summary production requirements of the United States Court of International Trade.

**Background:** In the ACE environment, the data required for CBP Form 7501, CBP Form 3461 in the Simplified Entry (Cargo Release) process, CBP Form 214 in the FTZ admission process, and CBP Form 7512 for Transportation Entries is transmitted electronically in discrete data sets, not in paper form, i.e., the data previously contained in these forms is now transmitted to CBP via ABI. Once transmitted and accepted by CBP, that data is stored by CBP. The filer's electronic transmission of that data through ABI fulfills the filer's entry and FTZ admissions obligation for these particular data sets. However, the filer must maintain, as is currently required, the underlying backup or supporting information from which the submitted information is derived.

**Requests for Data:** As a matter of policy, CBP will not request entry and FTZ data previously transmitted to and retained by CBP, unless CBP has a need for such records. If CBP needs such records, the filer may re-transmit or otherwise provide the data electronically or reproduce the entry/entry summary data using an ACE report. Note that entry data and information previously presented to and retained by CBP is not subject to a recordkeeping penalty for non-production if such data or information is subsequently requested.

**Versions:** Filers must retain all versions of entries, entry summaries and FTZ admissions submitted to CBP in order to comply with their recordkeeping requirements. All versions are received and processed by CBP, regardless of status. Consequently, all versions submitted to CBP must be retained by the filer. As a policy matter, CBP will not require the production of the non-final version of a data submission unless it is necessary for analytical, statistical, investigative or other purposes.

**Accessibility:** How a broker/filer provides copies of the transmissions to the importer of record is a business decision between the importer and the broker/filer. However, as entry summary information is accessible via the ACE Portal, an ACE Portal report, as for example, ESM-7008, would be an acceptable format for that purpose. CBP

plans on continuously expanding and improving ACE reports functionality that will assist a filer in responding to a request for records.

## State accepting applications for DTAG membership

On February 3, 2016, the Department of State published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) [Public Notice: 9431] announcing that the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Political-Military Affairs' Defense Trade Advisory Group (DTAG) is accepting membership applications. The Bureau of Political- Military Affairs is interested in applications from subject matter experts from the United States defense industry, relevant trade and labor associations, academic, and foundation personnel.

The DTAG was established as an advisory committee under the authority of 22 U.S.C. 2651a and 2656 and the *Federal Advisory Committee Act*, 5 U.S.C. App. (FACA). The purpose of the DTAG is to provide the Bureau of Political-Military Affairs with a formal channel for regular consultation and coordination with U.S. private sector defense exporters and defense trade organizations on issues involving U.S. laws, policies, and regulations for munitions exports. The DTAG advises the Bureau on its support for and regulation of defense trade to help ensure that impediments to legitimate exports are reduced while the foreign policy and national security interests of the United States continue to be protected and advanced in accordance with the *Arms Export Control Act* (AECA), as amended. Major topics addressed by the DTAG include (a) policy issues on commercial defense trade and technology transfer; (b) regulatory and licensing procedures applicable to defense articles, services, and technical data; (c) technical issues involving the U.S. Munitions List (USML); and (d) questions relating to actions designed to carry out the AECA and *International Traffic in Arms Regulations* (ITAR).

Members are appointed by the Assistant Secretary of State for Political- Military Affairs on the basis of individual substantive and technical expertise and qualifications, and must be representatives of United States defense industry, relevant trade and labor associations, academic, and foundation personnel. In accordance with the DTAG Charter, all DTAG members must be U.S. citizens, and DTAG members will represent the views of their organizations. All DTAG members shall be aware of the Department of State's mandate that arms transfers must further U.S. national security and foreign policy interests. DTAG members also shall be versed in the complexity of commercial defense trade and industrial competitiveness, and all members must be able to advise the Bureau on these matters. While members are expected to use their expertise and provide candid advice, national security and foreign policy interests of the United States, as well as the interests of the entities they represent, shall be the bases for all policy and technical recommendations.

## BIS updates legal authorities and citations

On February 29, 2016, the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) published in the *Federal Register* a [final rule](#) [Docket No. 160212107-6107-01] that updates the Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) legal authority citations in the *National Se-*

*curity Industrial Base Regulations* (NSIBR) and the *Export Administration Regulations* (EAR). The citation updates reflect recent editorial reclassifications within the United States Code, the repeal of certain statutory authorities, the continuation of an emergency declared in an executive order, and minor stylistic edits. This is a nonsubstantive rule that only updates legal authority paragraphs of the NSIBR and the EAR. It does not alter any right, obligation or prohibition that applies to any person under the NSIBR or the EAR. The rule is effective February 29, 2016.

## BIS revises Entity List

On February 23, 2016, the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) published in the *Federal Register* a [final rule](#) [Docket No. 151209999-5999-01] that amends the *Export Administration Regulations* (EAR) by adding eight persons under eight entries to the Entity List. The eight persons who are added to the Entity List have been determined by the U.S. Government to be acting contrary to the national security or foreign policy interests of the United States. These eight persons will be listed on the Entity List under the destination of the United Arab Emirates (U.A.E.). This final rule also removes nine persons from the Entity List, as the result of a request for removal submitted by these persons, a review of information provided in the removal request in accordance with the procedure for requesting removal or modification of an Entity List entity and further review conducted by the End-User Review Committee (ERC). Finally, this rule is also revising six existing entries in the Entity List. One entry under Iran is modified to correct the entry by updating the *Federal Register* citation. Five entries on the Entity List under the destinations of Armenia, Greece, India, Pakistan and the United Kingdom (U.K.) are modified to reflect a removal from the Entity List.

The rule was effective upon publication.

## BIS and State propose revisions to EAR/CCL and ITAR/USML for fire control, laser, imaging, and guidance and control equipment

On February 19, 2016, the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) published in the *Federal Register* a [proposed rule](#) [Docket No. 140221170–5728–02] that describes how articles the President determines no longer warrant control under Category XII (Fire Control, Laser, Imaging, and Guidance and Control Equipment) of the United States Munitions List (USML) of the *International Traffic in Arms Regulations* (ITAR) would be controlled under the Commerce Control List (CCL) of the *Export Administration Regulations* (EAR) by amending Export Control Classification Number (ECCN) 7A611 and creating new “600 series” ECCNs 7B611, 7D611, and 7E611. In addition, for certain dual-use infrared detection items, this proposed rule would expand controls for certain software and technology, eliminate the use of some license exceptions, revise licensing policy, and expand license requirements for certain transactions involving military end users or foreign military commodities. This proposed rule would also harmonize provisions within the EAR by revising controls related to certain quartz rate sensors and uncooled thermal imaging cameras.

BIS published a proposed rule entitled “*Revisions to the Export Administration Regulations (EAR): Control of Fire Control, Range Finder, Optical, and Guidance and Control Equipment the President Determines No Longer Warrant Control Under the United States Munitions List (USML)*” (80 Fed. Reg. 25798, May 5, 2015) (“May 5 proposed rule”). That proposed rule was published in conjunction with a proposed rule published by the Department of State’s Directorate of Defense Trade Controls (DDTC) to propose controls for the ITAR’s USML Category XII.

Also on February 19, 2016, the Department of State published a [proposed rule](#) [Public Notice: 9445] to amend the ITAR to revise Category XII (fire control, laser, imaging, and guidance and control equipment) of the USML to describe more precisely the articles warranting control on the USML. The Department also proposes to amend USML Categories VIII, XIII, and XV to reflect that items now described in those Categories will be in the revised Category XII.

The proposed changes described in the BIS proposed rule and the corresponding changes in the State Department's proposed amendment to USML Category XII are based, in part, on a review of public comments submitted in response to the May 5 proposed rule.

Comments on each proposed rule must be received by the respective agency by April 4, 2016.

### **BIS and State propose rules to clarify and revise certain export license requirements for military aircraft, gas turbine engines and related items**

On February 9, 2016, the BIS published in the *Federal Register* a [proposed rule](#) [Docket No. 151030999-5999-01] that would modify the Commerce Control List (CCL) entries for two types of items: military aircraft and related items, and military gas turbine engines and related items. The rule would add clarifying text to the descriptions of the types of military aircraft controlled on the CCL. The lists of items that are subject only to the anti-terrorism reason for control would be clarified and expanded. This proposed rule is based on a review of the military aircraft and gas turbine engine related entries that were added to the CCL on October 15, 2013. That review was intended to ensure that the regulatory changes made by the October 15, 2013 rule are clear, do not inadvertently control items in normal commercial use, account for technological developments, and properly implement the national security and foreign policy objectives of the export control reform effort. This proposed rule is being published simultaneously with a proposed rule by the Department of State, which is based on a review of Categories VIII and XIX of the United States Munitions List (USML) [See below]. This document also furthers the retrospective regulatory review directed by the President in Executive Order 13563.

Also on February 9, 2016, the Department of State published a [proposed rule](#) [Public Notice: 9395] to amend the *International Traffic in Arms Regulations* (ITAR) to revise Categories VIII (aircraft and related articles) and XIX (gas turbine engines and associated equipment) of the U.S. Munitions List (USML) to describe more precisely the articles warranting control on the USML. The revisions contained in this rule are part of the President's Export Control Reform (ECR) effort and the Department of State's retrospective plan under E.O. 13563.

Comments on each of the proposed rules must be received by the respective agency by March 25, 2016.

## FTC challenge to 'Made in USA' and other U.S. origin claims

We wanted to let you know about a lawsuit the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) recently filed contesting an Ohio company's use of U.S.-origin claims. The complaint, filed earlier this week in U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Ohio, alleges that the company deceived consumers by making unqualified U.S.-origin claims. More specifically, the complaint alleges that the company used unqualified "Made in the USA" and "Proudly Made in the USA" claims for its glue products, when a significant proportion of the cost of the chemical inputs (~55%) are attributable to imported chemicals. A copy of the complaint can be found [here](#). As you know, the FTC has strict requirements for making unqualified U.S.-origin claims, such as "Made in USA". Specifically, the FTC rules require, among other things that the product contain "all or virtually all" U.S. content (generally,

viewed as 95%+ US content by cost) in order to be eligible for an unqualified U.S.-origin claim.

This case is important for a couple of reasons:

First, the case serves as an important reminder to all companies that utilize U.S.-origin claims on their products (or that sell other companies' products that contain U.S.-origin claims) that they need to be extra vigilant in this area. Given that the rules for making such claims can seem counterintuitive (e.g., just because a product is made, or even last substantially transformed, here in the United States does not automatically mean it can be labeled "Made in USA"), such claims are often a trap for the unwary.

Second, it is important to note that the FTC is pursuing this action through litigation. Typically, the FTC's policy is to police these types of claims administratively (*i.e.*, closing the case without action if there is no violation, or getting the company to enter into an administrative consent order if there is a violation). Here, the FTC could not resolve the matter administratively, so is forced to sue the company in U.S. district court. This could result in the court considering whether the FTC's "all or virtually all" U.S.-content test is appropriate/sustainable.

## FAS accepting affidavits for eligible wool products duty refunds

On February 1, 2016, the Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice](#) announcing that it will accept affidavits from individuals or firms to substantiate eligibility for distributions from the Refund of Duties Paid on Imports of Certain Wool Products program (the Refund program) authorized under Section 12315 of the *Agricultural Act of 2014* (Pub. L. 113– 79) (the Act). For calendar year 2016 distributions, affidavits must be electronically filed with FAS no later than March 1, 2016.

Section 12315 transferred the Refund program to the U.S. Department of Agriculture in FY 2016, from Customs and Border Protection, Department of Homeland Security. The Refund program is one of several programs authorized by Congress within the Agriculture Wool Apparel Manufacturers Trust Fund for each of calendar years 2016 through 2019. The purpose of the Refund program is to compensate wool manufacturers of men's and boy's wool suits, suit type jackets, or trousers of imported worsted wool fabrics of the kind described in heading 9902.51.11 or 9902.51.12; manufacturers of worsted wool fabrics who import wool yarn of the kind described in heading 9902.51.13; and manufacturers of wool yarn or fabric who import wool fiber or top of the kind described in heading 9902.51.14 of the *Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States* for customs duties paid on imported wool in 2000, 2001 and 2002. To claim a distribution from the Refund program manufacturers are directed to submit an affidavit that follows the statutory procedures specified under Section 12315(b) of the Act, and also as described on the [FAS Web site](#). Because section 12315 is self effectuating, FAS will not be issuing regulations to implement the program this year. The notice announces the deadline and [email address](#) to which claims, affidavits and supporting documents must be sent.

## Commerce publishes quarterly subsidy list for in-quota cheese

On February 4, 2016, the International Trade Administration, Commerce (ITA) published in the *Federal Register* the [quarterly update](#) to annual listing of foreign government subsidies on articles of cheese subject to an in-quota rate of duty, as required by section 702 of the *Trade Agreements Act of 1979*, as amended. The only country with a subsidy program was Canada (Export Assistance on Certain Types of Cheese) with a gross and net subsidy of \$0.45/pound.

## Energy reopens comment period on import certifications

On February 17, 2016, the Department of Energy (DOE) published in the *Federal Register* a [notice of a public meeting and reopening of the comment period](#) [Docket No. EERE-2015-BT-CE-0019] on its notice of proposed rulemaking published in the *Federal Register* on December 29, 2015, proposing that a person importing into the United States any covered product or equipment subject to an applicable energy conservation standard provide, prior to importation, a certification of admissibility to the DOE. The comment period ended February 12, 2016. After receiving several requests for additional time to prepare and submit comments, DOE has decided to reopen the period for submitting comments. In addition, DOE announces a public meeting and webinar regarding its proposal. DOE

is reopening the comment period until February 29, 2016. DOE will accept comments, data, and information in response to the notice of proposed rulemaking received no later than February 29, 2016.

## Government procurement: DoD to negotiate reciprocal MOU with Estonia

The *ASEAN Economic Community (AEC) Blueprint 2025*, adopted by 10 ASEAN Member States namely Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam, at the 27th ASEAN Summit on 22 November 2015 in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, provides broad directions through strategic measures for the AEC from 2016 to 2025. Along with the ASEAN Community Vision 2025, and the ASEAN Political-Security Community Blueprint 2025 and the ASEAN Socio-Cultural Community Blueprint 2025, the AEC Blueprint 2025 forms part of ASEAN 2025: Forging Ahead Together. It succeeds the AEC Blueprint 2015, which was adopted in 2007.

The AEC Blueprint 2025 builds on the AEC Blueprint 2015 and aims to enhance the following five interrelated and mutually reinforcing characteristics in the ASEAN region:

- (i) a highly integrated and cohesive economy;
- (ii) a competitive, innovative, and dynamic ASEAN;
- (iii) enhanced connectivity and sectoral cooperation;
- (iv) a resilient, inclusive, people-oriented, and people-centred ASEAN; and

## Australia

### New duty rates for certain tobacco and tobacco products on 1 Mar.

[Department of Immigration and Border Protection \(DIBP\) Notice No. 2016/05](#) (25 February 2016), announced that, in accordance with the indexation provisions in section 19AB of the *Customs Tariff Act 1995* (the Tariff Act), the customs duty rates on certain tobacco and tobacco products, in Schedule 3 of the Tariff Act, will increase on 1 March 2016. The Notice sets out the new customs duty rates for excise-equivalent goods (Table 1) and excise duty rates (Table 2).

The new rates also apply to goods subject to indexation in Schedule 5 (US originating goods), Schedule 6 (Thai originating goods), Schedule 7 (Chilean originating goods), Schedule 8 (ASEAN-Australia-New Zealand originating goods), Schedule 9 (Malaysian originating goods), Schedule 10 (Korean originating goods), Schedule 11 (Japanese originating goods) and Schedule 12 (Chinese originating goods) in the Tariff Act.

The DIBP will arrange for the publication of a Notice of Substituted Rates of Customs Duty for Excise-Equivalent Goods Notice (No. 2) 2016 in the *Commonwealth Gazette* on 1 March 2016.

### Iran sanctions changes

The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) has [announced](#) that the Australian Government is implementing changes to Australia's sanctions on Iran in line with its international obligations under UN Security Council resolutions.

The Australian Government will apply the changes to UN sanctions on Iran as required by UN Security Council Resolution 2231, although others will remain in place.

The Australian Government has decided to suspend certain autonomous sanctions on Iran, while others will remain in place. For more information, please read DFAT's [Iran Frequently Asked Questions](#).

The [Iran sanctions website](#) will be amended to reflect the changes to Australian sanction laws as they take legislative effect. Australia has lifted all nuclear-related economic and financial sanctions. However, some restrictions remain in force, including restrictions on the transfer of proliferation sensitive goods, the arms and ballistic missiles embargoes and the restrictive measures against some designated persons and entities.

## Japan

### Japan imposes sanctions on N. Korea

The on-line newspaper Japan Today (and several others) [reported](#) that Prime Minister Abe announced that on February 10, 2016, Japan imposed new sanctions against the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK or North Korea) because of the DPRK's most recent launch of a new long-range rocket on February 7. The sanctions prohibit the entry of all North Korean ships to Japanese ports and travel activities between the two countries. In addition, money transfers of more than 100,000 yen (about U.S.\$870) to North Korea are banned, except those which are intended for humanitarian aid. The Japanese Government has not yet posted the text of the sanctions.

### Japan revises its 'End User List'

On January 22, 2016, the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry (METI) [announced](#) that it has revised its [End User List](#) providing exporters with information on foreign entities for which concern cannot be eliminated regarding involvement in activities such as the development of weapons of mass destruction and other items, for the purpose of enhancing the effectiveness of the "catch-all control" on cargos and other loads relating to weapons of mass destruction and other items. Catch-all control is a system that obliges exporters to submit an application for an export license for goods that may be used for the development of weapons of mass destruction even if they are not subject to export restrictions under international agreements.

The End User List has been revised based on the latest information to contain 457 entities (decreased by 70 entities from the previous version) in 11 countries and regions.

## Korea

### South Korea shuts down Gaeseong Industrial Complex

On February 10, 2016, the South Korean Ministry of Unification [announced](#) that as a result of the recent launching of a long-range missile after a nuclear test, it was shutting down the Gaeseong (also spelled Kaesong) Industrial Complex, which is located in the north and uses North Korean workers and South Korean managers. The announcement said:

To date, the total amount of cash that flowed into North Korea through the Gaeseong Industrial Complex is 616 billion won (560 million dollars), with 132 billion won (120 million dollars) in cash having flowed into North Korea last year alone, and the Government and the private sector have invested a total of 1.019 trillion won. It appears that such funds have not been used to pave the way to peace as the international community had hoped, but rather to upgrade its nuclear weapons and long-range missiles.

This tramples on the efforts of the Korean Government and the 124 businesses that have set up shop in the Gaeseong Industrial Complex, and puts at risk the lives and safety of the Korean people.

The Government has notified the North Korean authorities of the decision and called on them to extend such cooperation as is rendered necessary by the complete shutdown of the Gaeseong Industrial Complex, including the safe return of South Korean citizens. The Government said it will move expeditiously forward with all steps to ensure the safe return of its citizens, and will set up a Govern-

ment Task Force under the Office for Government Policy Coordination to provide the necessary whole-of-government assistance to our businesses.

## New Zealand

### New Zealand removes UN sanctions against Iran

On 19 February 2016, Foreign Minister M. McCully announced that New Zealand has completed the domestic processes required to lift the United Nations sanctions against Iran. The [United Nations \(Iran—Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action\) Regulations 2016](#) (SR 2016/9), which come into force on 19 February 2016, replace the current [United Nations Sanctions \(Iran\) Regulations 2010](#) by imposing a new suite of restrictions in relation to Iran to give effect to [UN Security Council Resolution 2231](#), adopted under the United Nations Charter on 20 July 2015.

Resolution 2231 has replaced the sanctions imposed on Iran by resolution 1747 (2007) and related resolutions with a number of restrictions relating to—

- nuclear-related material, equipment, or technology:
- ballistic missile-related technology:
- Iran's investment in the nuclear industry:
- specified military equipment and other arms:
- the property of designated persons:
- entry and transit of designated persons into and through New Zealand.

A summary of the [United Nations \(Iran—Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action\) Regulations 2016](#) follows:

[Regulations 1](#) and [2](#) provide for the title and commencement of these regulations.

[Regulation 3](#) provides a scheme of revocation of groups of provisions of these regulations according to a timeline set out in resolution 2231.

[Regulation 4](#) is an interpretation provision, containing definitions and support provisions and a provision relating to the publication of external material that these regulations incorporate by reference.

[Regulations 5 to 11](#) concern nuclear-related material, equipment, or technology. Restrictions are imposed on the exportation of such goods to Iran, or for use in or for the benefit of Iran. Such exportation must be approved in advance by the Security Council and must be supported by an end-user guarantee accepted by the Secretary of Foreign Affairs and Trade. Associated provisions are concerned with the loading and carriage of these restricted goods onto New Zealand craft, providing related assistance and training, engaging in associated commercial transactions, and the application of the [Customs and Excise Act 1996](#).

[Regulation 12](#) restricts persons from engaging in financial transactions with Iran in relation to the nuclear industry. The intended effect is to limit Iranian investment in that industry.

[Regulations 13 to 20](#) concern ballistic missile-type technology. Restrictions are imposed on both exportation to Iran and importation from Iran. In addition, a number of associated provisions similar to those that apply to nuclear-related material, equipment, or technology are included.

[Regulations 21 to 28](#) concern arms. The importation of all arms from Iran is restricted, while exportation to Iran is restricted only in relation to certain specified arms. Associated provisions are again included.

[Regulations 29 to 31](#) implement an asset freeze against designated individuals and entities by prohibiting certain transactions with those persons.

[Regulation 32](#) prohibits individuals who are designated persons from entering or transiting through New Zealand.

[Regulations 33](#) and [34](#) create offences and require the consent of the Attorney-General for certain prosecutions.

[Regulation 35](#) revokes the [United Nations Sanctions \(Iran\) Regulations 2010](#), which these regulations replace.

Companies trading with Iran will no longer need to register with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

## New law for food importers from 1 March 2016

The Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI) [reminds](#) importers that the law on importing food is changing with the *Food Act 2014* that comes into force on 1 March 2016. The posted reminder states:

The *Food Act 2014* strengthens food safety in New Zealand. It requires importers to show the food they sell is safe.

The most significant change is that people or businesses wishing to import food into New Zealand must either register with the Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI) as a food importer or use a registered food importer to import on their behalf. Under the current rules, food importers must only 'list' with MPI.

Registration will help MPI communicate with importers, for example if there is a food safety incident.

It will also help other businesses contact importers. The register of food importers will be available on this website. Registration will help assure customers that the food they buy is safe.

All currently listed importers are deemed registered until the 1st anniversary of their current listing that falls after 1 July 2016.

From 1 March 2016

Food must be imported through a registered importer.

Registered importers must:

- start paying a fee to register
- renew registration each year
- keep or have access to records to show where food has come from and that it's safe (under the current law you must keep records yourself, under the new law, someone else can keep records for you)
- get food safety clearance for foods of high regulatory interest (formerly called prescribed foods) – there will be a few changes to how you do this.

## Europe

### European Union (EU) and European Free Trade Association (EFTA)

#### EU revises Belarus sanctions

On 27 February 2016, the *Official Journal* published [Council Decision \(CFSP\) 2016/280 of 25 February 2016 amending Decision 2012/642/CFSP concerning restrictive measures against Belarus](#) (the Decision), [Council Regulation \(EU\) 2016/277 of 25 February 2016 amending Regulation \(EC\) No 765/2006 concerning restrictive measures in respect of Belarus](#) (the Regulation) and [Council Implementing Regulation \(EU\) 2016/276 of 25 February 2016 implementing Article 8a\(1\) of Regulation \(EC\) No 765/2006 concerning restrictive measures in respect of Belarus](#) (the Implementing Regulation). The Decision extends certain restrictive measures against Belarus until 28 February 2017 and maintains the asset freeze and travel ban for four persons listed in Annex I (renamed “Annex”) to Decision 2012/642/CFSP but deletes Annex II in its entirety. The Regulation and Implementing Regulation make conforming amendments to Regulation (EC) No 765/2006.

#### UK schedules referendum on EU membership

On 20 February 2016, Prime Minister Cameron made a [statement](#) in which he announced that after the agreement in Brussels on a new settlement with the EU for Britain (see below) that he updated the Cabinet and they agreed that the government’s position will be to recommend that Britain remains in a reformed European Union. The Prime Minister stated in part:

I am the first to say that there are still many ways in which Europe needs to improve – and that the task of reforming Europe does not end with yesterday’s agreement.

And I will never say that our country couldn’t survive outside Europe.

We are Great Britain – we can achieve great things.

That is not the question in this referendum.

The question is will we be safer, stronger and better off working together in a reformed Europe or out on our own. I believe we will be safer in a reformed Europe, because we can work with our European partners to fight cross border crime and terrorism.

I believe Britain will be stronger in a reformed Europe because we can play a leading role in one of the world’s largest organisations from within, helping to make the big decisions on trade and security that determine our future.

And I believe we will be better off in a reformed Europe because British businesses will have full access to the free trade single market, bringing jobs, investment and lower prices.

Let me be clear. Leaving Europe would threaten our economic and our national security.

Those who want to leave Europe cannot tell you if British businesses would be able to access Europe's free trade single market or if working people's jobs are safe or how much prices would rise.

All they are offering is risk at a time of uncertainty – a leap in the dark.

Our plan for Europe gives us the best of both worlds.

It underlines our special status through which families across Britain get all the benefits of being in the EU, including more jobs, lower prices and greater security.

But our special status also means we are out of the parts of Europe that don't work for us.

So we will never join the euro, we will never be part of eurozone bailouts, never be part of the passport-free no borders area, or a European army or an EU superstate.

Three years ago I committed to the British people that I would renegotiate our position in the European Union and hold an in-out referendum.

Now I am delivering that commitment.

You will decide.

The Prime Minister then announced that on 22 February he will commence the process set out under our Referendum Act and go to Parliament and propose that the British people decide Britain's future in Europe through an in-out referendum on 23 June 2016.

## European Council agrees to new status for the UK if it remains in EU

At its 18-19 February 2016 meeting, the [European Council agreed](#) that the following set of arrangements will become effective on the date the Government of the United Kingdom (UK) informs the Secretary-General of the Council that the UK has decided to remain a member of the EU, constitute an appropriate response to the concerns of the UK, as expressed in a [letter from the British Prime Minister dated 10 November 2015](#):

- a Decision of the Heads of State or Government, meeting within the European Council, concerning a new settlement for the United Kingdom within the European Union (Annex I);
- a statement containing a draft Council Decision on specific provisions relating to the effective management of the banking union and of the consequences of further integration of the euro area which will be adopted on the day the Decision referred to in point (a) takes effect (Annex II);
- a Declaration of the European Council on competitiveness (Annex III);
- a Declaration of the Commission on a subsidiarity implementation mechanism and a burden reduction implementation mechanism (Annex IV);
- a Declaration of the European Commission on the indexation of child benefits exported to a Member State other than that where the worker resides (Annex V);
- a Declaration of the Commission on the safeguard mechanism referred to in paragraph 2(b) of Section D of the Decision of the Heads of State or Government (Annex VI);
- a Declaration of the Commission on issues related to the abuse of the right of free movement of persons (Annex VII).

The Heads of State or Government declared that:

- this Decision gives legal guarantee that the matters of concern to the United Kingdom as expressed in the letter of 10 November 2015 have been addressed;



- the content of the Decision is fully compatible with the Treaties;
- this Decision is legally binding, and may be amended or repealed only by common accord of the Heads of State or Government of the Member States of the European Union;
- this Decision will take effect on the date the Government of the United Kingdom informs the Secretary-General of the Council that the United Kingdom has decided to remain a member of the European Union.

It is understood that, should the result of the referendum in the United Kingdom be for it to leave the European Union, the set of arrangements referred to above will cease to exist.

## Commission establishes a procedure to implement Court of Justice judgments in footwear dumping cases

On 18 February 2016, the *Official Journal* published [Commission Implementing Regulation \(EU\) 2016/223 of 17 February 2016](#) establishing a procedure for assessing certain market economy treatment (MET) and individual treatment (IT) claims made by exporting producers from China and Vietnam, and implementing the judgment of the Court of Justice in joined cases C-659/13 and C-34/14. The Regulation provides that:

National customs authorities, which have received a request for re-imbursement, based on Article 236 of the *Community Customs Code*, of anti-dumping duties imposed by Regulation (EC) No 1472/2006 or Implementing Regulation (EU) No 1294/2009 and collected by national customs authorities, which is based on the fact that a non-sampled exporting producer had requested MET or IT, shall forward that request and any supporting documents to the Commission.

Within eight months of the receipt of the request and any supporting documents, the Commission shall verify whether the exporting producer had indeed lodged an MET and IT claim. If so, the Commission shall assess that claim and re-impose the appropriate duty by means of a Commission Implementing Regulation, after disclosure pursuant to Article 20 of the basic Regulation.

The national customs authorities shall await the publication of the relevant Commission Implementing Regulation re-imposing the duties before deciding on the claim for repayment and remission of anti-dumping duties.

## EU begins public consultation concerning possible change to PRC anti-dumping methodology

The EU has launched an [online consultation](#) concerning a possible change in the methodology to establish dumping in trade defence investigations concerning the People's Republic of China (PRC).

On 11 December 2016, certain provisions of the Accession Protocol to the WTO of the PRC expire. As a result of this expiry, the European Commission is analysing the possible impact on the EU's anti-dumping legislation ([Regulation \(EC\) N° 1225/2009](#)). Should an amendment of the anti-dumping legislation be deemed necessary, this may result in lower anti-dumping duties which may not offset the negative effects of dumping and may further increase dumped imports causing further injury to the EU industries concerned. This in turn may result in putting a number of jobs in the EU at risk.

The aim of the online consultation launched today is to collect stakeholders' input regarding the options on how to respond to the expiry of certain provisions of the Accession Protocol to the WTO of the PRC. The consultation aims to ensure that all relevant stakeholders have an opportunity to comment on the economic and

social impacts of the options under consideration.

The Commission will utilise the results of the consultation to help it identify the most suitable regulatory and non-regulatory actions to put into effect and decide whether – and how, in a sensible, effective and efficient manner – to propose amendments to [Regulation \(EC\) N° 1225/2009](#) and [Regulation \(EC\) N°597/2009](#).

The received contributions to the online consultation, together with the identification data of the respondent, will be published on the internet, unless the respondent objects to publication of their identification data by clicking the appropriate box in the questionnaire (see section 1 in the questionnaire). ## IP implications of EU customs law development

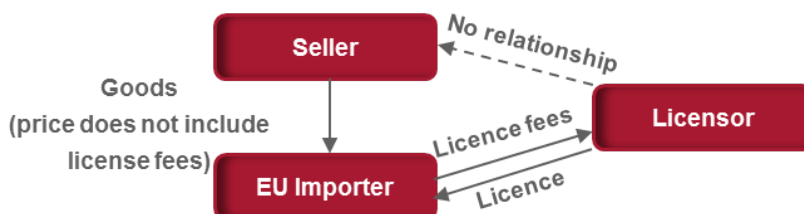
We wanted to bring to your attention an important EU customs law development. That may sound like it doesn't have much to do with Intellectual Property (IP), but it does!

The following is from a detailed Client Alert entitled [Significant increase in circumstances when royalties and licence fees will be dutiable](#), that was prepared by [Michelle Blunt](#) (London IP Practice) and the European Trade and Commerce Practice.

From 1 May 2016, EU customs legislation will begin to undergo a complete overhaul. One of the key changes relates to royalties and IP licence fees for goods imported into the EU. These changes will result in a significant increase in cases where those payments are dutiable and therefore need to be included in the customs value of the imported goods. This will in turn result in an increase in the amount of customs duty and import VAT payable on the goods. The key changes are:

- Significant expansion of the "condition of sale" requirement. It will be now considered fulfilled if the buyer of the goods being valued cannot purchase the goods without paying the royalty and/or licence fee.

- Removal of the distinction between trademark royalties and other royalties and licence fees. Trademark royalties will be subject to the same requirements as other royalties and licence fees.

It is advisable to review how royalty/licence fees are structured for goods you import into the EU. If those payments will be caught by the changes we can provide advice on possible ways to mitigate that impact. In some cases that may involve making changes to the terms of your licence agreements.

Binding Tariff Information is issued on request to economic operators by the customs authorities of the Member States. It is valid throughout the Community, regardless of the Member State which issued it. For information about an existing BTI, you may want to contact the [customs administration of the Member State](#) which issued it. However, remember that, according to the provisions for data protection, there are limitations as to the information an administration can provide. You can search and consult existing BTIs on the [EBTI-database](#).

On 23 February 2016, the World Trade Organization (WTO) [announced](#) that South Africa deposited its instrument of acceptance for the 2005 protocol amending the WTO's *Agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights* (TRIPS) on 23 February 2016, becoming the fourth WTO member to do so in 2016. The announcement stated:

Thailand (on 28 January), Mali (on 20 January) and Lesotho (on 4 January) are the other three members that have accepted the amendment this year. The protocol will enter into force once two-thirds of the WTO membership has formally accepted it. South Africa's acceptance marks another step towards the threshold.

The protocol amending the TRIPS Agreement, which was adopted in 2005, is intended to make it easier for poorer WTO members to access affordable medicines. The protocol allows exporting countries to grant compulsory licenses (one that is granted without the patent holder's consent) to their generic suppliers to manufacture and export medicines to countries that cannot manufacture the needed medicines themselves. These licenses were originally limited to predominantly supplying the domestic market.

The following WTO members have accepted the amendment: Albania, Argentina, Australia, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Botswana, Brazil, Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, Canada, Central African Republic, Chile, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Croatia, Dominican Republic, Egypt, El Salvador, European Union, Grenada, Honduras, Hong Kong China, Iceland, India, Indonesia, Israel, Japan, Jordan, Kenya, the Republic of Korea, Lao PDR, Lesotho, Macao China, Malaysia, Mali, Mauritius, Mexico, Moldova, Mongolia, Montenegro, Morocco, Myanmar, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Norway, Pakistan, Panama, Philippines, Rwanda, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, Senegal, Singapore, South Africa, Sri Lanka, Switzerland, Chinese Taipei, Thailand, the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Togo, Trinidad and Tobago, Turkey, Uganda, United States, Uruguay, and Zambia.




